**FERRIS WANTED FOR
STEALING COPPER**

Sayre Young Man Arrested at Waverly Yesterday on a Serious Charge

Howard Ferris, of this place, who, however, says that his right name is Saxton Ferris, was arrested at "Boney" Thompson's place in Waverly yesterday afternoon by Officer Bob DeGross, on a warrant charging him with the larceny of a quantity of copper and also 17 head light reflectors, the property of the Lehigh Valley railroad company. The articles taken are valued at \$75. The complaint on which the warrant for Ferris' arrest was issued was made yesterday afternoon before a Sayre justice, by Special Officer Johnson of the Lehigh Valley detective force. For some time the company has been missing copper and other articles, and on Monday it was learned that a quantity of copper and the head-light reflectors had been disposed of to a junk dealer in Waverly by a young man answering Ferris' description. The warrant was issued and placed in the hands of Officer DeGross. The latter went to Waverly and found the man in Thompson's place. He was placed under arrest and later taken before Justice Hoagland who held him until four o'clock this afternoon when the case will be disposed of. Ferris is well known in Sayre and has given the police officers considerable trouble during the past year. He has been arrested several times for drunkenness and disorderly conduct but in each instance has been allowed to go by the local authorities. A few weeks ago, however, he went to Waverly and while there he felt under the notice of the police and was sent to Owego 15 days for being drunk. Since his return to Sayre nothing has been heard of him until yesterday, when the Lehigh officers discovered evidence which they claim will connect him with the copper and headlight reflectors purchased by the Waverly junk dealer.

**ACCUSED OF MURDER
MOTHER TAKES BLAME**

Son Who Threw Man from Parents' House and Injured Him Fatally Pleads Justification

George Western Dentinger, 24 years old, of Weissport, this state, is in jail at Mauch Chunk, charged with the murder of W. H. Oswald, a grocer who also resides at Weissport. Oswald was 45 years old and leaves a widow and four children.

The tragedy occurred early Sunday morning. Dentinger resides with his widowed mother, who is 45 years old. A younger brother also resides at home. When Dentinger arrived home at midnight on Saturday night he found Oswald in a compromising position with his mother. The young man ordered Oswald to leave the house but the man refused to go. A scuffle followed and Dentinger was thrown down stairs. Dentinger renewed the attack and the next instant pitched Oswald into the street on to the icy pavement. Oswald went home badly bruised and bleeding. Shortly after his arrival at home he was taken violently ill and in eight hours after receiving the injuries was dead. A post mortem examination by the coroner developed an eight ounce blood clot on the brain. Dentinger was arrested, but when arraigned claimed that he was justified in throwing the man out doors. Dentinger's mother was in court and hysterically assumed all the blame for the fight which resulted in Oswald's death. She insisted that she told her son to throw the man out of the house. The outcome of Dentinger's case will be watched with interest.

**SCHOOL DIRECTORS
EXONERATED TAXES**

Held Meeting in High School Building Last Night for That Purpose

The Sayre borough school directors held a special meeting last night in the high school building for the purpose of listening to applications for the exoneration of certain taxes. Directors Thompson, Whittle, Brainerd, Cook, Baltz and Maddock, and Tax Collector J. L. Plumstead were present.

The taxes of the following widows and indigent persons on the 1904 duplicate were exonerated: Mrs. Michael Curry, Mrs. Hamilton, Mrs. Donovan, Richard Driscoll and John Sackett.

The taxes on heirs, 62 double assessments and assessments against people and properties that never had any existence were also exonerated, which with the widows and indigent persons made a total of \$229.08 for school purposes and \$49.90 for building purposes.

A tax amounting to \$132 against the W. S. & A. Traction company was exonerated, but an effort will probably be made to collect this sum through the courts.

Occupation tax to the amount of \$465.53 was exonerated, making a total in all classes of \$744.41 on the 1905 duplicate.

Taxes on the 1905 duplicate to the amount of \$134.23 were exonerated and the board adjourned.

Japanese Enterprise.

The contract to supply with provisions for one year the men who are building the Western Pacific railroad through Nevada, under the Utah Construction company, was awarded recently to a San Francisco Japanese firm, which underbid white contractors. The Japanese have a ten-year lease of a building at Reno, where they expect to do business permanently.
