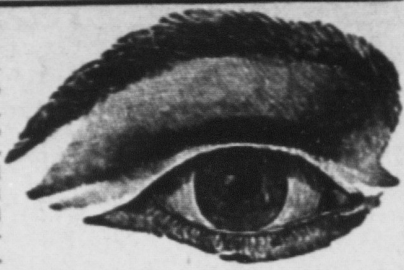

NO SETTLEMENT YET.

Miners and Operators Form a Committee to Discuss Terms.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—The special scale committee of the union anthracite mine workers of Pennsylvania appeared before the president and other officials of the coal mining companies here and stated in general terms the propositions it desired the operators to grant.

Before the conference adjourned two subcommittees, of seven men each, were appointed, one representing the miners and the other the operators, to take up jointly the questions at issue and endeavor to reach an agreement. When these committees have completed their work they will make a report to the conference.

The utmost good feeling prevailed during the meeting, and there were many signs that all matters at issue may be settled without resort to a strike. That the mine workers were not completely prepared to go ahead with the negotiations came as a surprise to the operators, as they had been led to believe that the miners had perfected their case. The operators were fully prepared to proceed, and some of them were disappointed that the representatives of the men were not quite ready.

The conference, so far as it related to the coal companies, was the most representative that has ever met.

President Mitchell when seen refused to make any comment on the outcome of the first meeting, but inquiry among the other mine workers showed that they were as a whole well satisfied with the situation.

The principal demands of the miners are for the eight hour day, a 10 per cent increase and recognition of their union.
