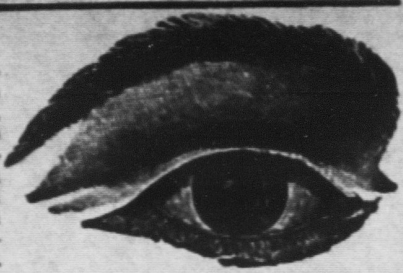

**KEPT POLICE AT BAY WITH A GUN**

**A CRAZY FRENCHMAN DEFIES GENDARMES FOR WEEKS.**

**HOUSE BESIEGED BY LATTER**

Thomas Le Cleach, a Farmer, Battered Insane by Wrongs, Barricades Home—Finally Wounded and Captured.

Paris.—Thomas Le Cleach, a farmer, aged 54, is a prisoner and at the point of death at his home in Saint Pierre de Penmarc, Brittany, charged with having dangerously wounded a mason who had attempted to disarm him when he fired upon another and with having shot an officer while attempting to arrest him. Before he was taken he had for weeks defied the gendarmes and only when mortally hurt did his capture become possible. Le Cleach lost his wife a year ago, and has been a prey to melancholy ever since. Born in the little hamlet where he grew to manhood, he never left it till he served as a soldier and, having reverted to civil life, went back to his old home and married and settled down on a little farm. He has three children, the eldest an idiot the second a girl of six and the third a boy of three. He has some education and is regarded by his neighbors as the soul of honor.

Shortly before the death of his wife Le Cleach conceived the idea of building a maner against the extension of his house. He gave the contract to a mason named Le Pape. But hardly had the maner been completed when it collapsed, tearing away a large portion of the wall. Le Pape refused to do the work over and Le Cleach sued. After tedious delays the case went against him and the unfortunate farmer, his building destroyed and his money all gone to the lawyers, found himself practically ruined. He raged against Le Pape.
