SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 23 .- Fire in the central station of the San Francisco Gas and Electric company caused a loss estimated at \$1,000,000 besides crippling many commercial and manufacturing establishments.

All of the evening papers for hours were without power to run their machinery, even the linotypes being rendered useless. Nearly all of the telegraph wires leading out of this city are idle, the Western Union and Postal Telegraph companies having obtained their power from the station which was burned.
