Czar or Tsar! One of the subscribers to Youth's Companion asks the pertinent question why it has adopted the spelling tsa to designate the emperor of all the Russias. The most natural and obvious answer is that the spelling indicates the Russian pronunciation of the word, which czar does not. The title comes from an old Slavonic word, which the Encyclopaedia Britannica says is not derived from the Latin Caesar; but other authorities say that its ultimate derivation is from the Roman. The origin of the common spelling is supposed to be the writings of Herberstein, about 1550. The letter e in Roman-Slavonic has the sound of ts. The letter was copied. but the sound was not. The letter z never belonged in the word. The spelling ezar is now-says Murray's great English dictionary-regarded as old-fashloned. The accepted German spelling is zar, which is pronounced tear; the French have lately adopted tear as the spelling, and that form is increasing in use in English. The London Times, a most careful authority, employs it, and so does the Britannica in its supplementary vol-
