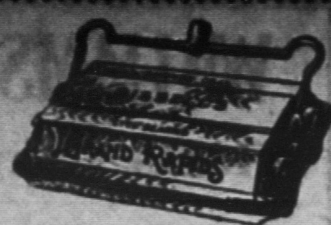

**INDUCING MECHANICS
TO LEAVE SAYRE**

Agent of the American Car Com-
—pany Has Been Doing a Little
—Quiet Business in Sayre

During the past two or three
—days quite a large number of ma-
—chinists, boilermakers, blacksmiths
—and their helpers have been induced
—to leave Sayre and go to Berwick
—to accept employment in the shops
—of the American Car company at
—that place. Saturday night an
—agent of the company came to
—Sayre and after making known the
—fact that he wanted men opened up
—headquarters at the Wilbur house.
—Saturday evening he was surround-
—ed by a crowd of mechanics, and it
—is said that he secured a large
—number of names of men who sig-
—nified their willingness to go to
—Berwick. The rate of wages offered,
—it is alleged, was considerably
—higher than that which is paid in
—Sayre, and therefore the agent ex-
—perienced but little difficulty in
—securing men. Several of the men
—who registered their names left for
—Berwick yesterday and this morn-
—ing another gang departed.

BEFORE ARBITRATORS**

Case of Drugan vs. Wiltse is At-

**ANOTHER HORSE
THIEF IN CUSTODY**

Ferris' Companion Is Arrested
—by the Authorities at Ithaca

Chief Walsh is in receipt of a
—communication from the authorities
—at Ithaca to the effect that William
—Ferris, who was arrested in Sayre
—for horse stealing, has also been
—taken in custody. Skinner and
—Ferris have both waived an exam-
—ination and have been held to the
—grand jury. Mrs. Smith Tubbs,
—who was found in company with
—Ferris at Sayre has been released
—by the Ithaca authorities upon her
—promise to appear against both
—men when she is wanted.

—goods to the county seat, he having
—decided to temporarily take up his

**BREWSTER IS IN
A HURRY TO HANG**

"Don't Put it Off Any Longer
—Than You Can Help," Pleads
—Coudersport Murderer

Charles Brewster, the Couders-
—port murderer, condemned for the
—killing of his father in law last fall
—is in a hurry to have the job com-
—pleted. "Don't put it off any
—longer than you can help; I wish
—that it had happened two weeks
—ago," he said the other day when
—the sheriff read the death warrant
—to him. Brewster is sentenced to
—be hanged Tuesday next, and the
—scaffold on which he will be exe-
—cuted was completed Saturday. It
—is built on the "saw buck" plan and
—is so arranged that the condemned
—is jerked into the air instead of
—dropped through a trap. A 500
—pound weight is adjusted to the
—side of the scaffold in such a man-
—ner that when it is released the
—victim shoots into the air a dis-
—tance of nearly eight feet. Years
—ago this was a popular method
—used by hangmen, but recently it
—has fallen into disuse. The gallows
—on which Brewster will hang stands
—in the open behind a barn at Coud-
—ersport and is the object of much
—curiosity, thousands of people vis-
—iting it daily.
