DOMINICAN TREATY. Foreign Relations Committee Favors Measure.

UNCLE SAM TO PRESERVE ORDER. Treaty Provides For Adjustment of Claims Against Republic of Santo Domingo Under the Supervision of the United States.

MUST DO SENTRY DUTY. Cadet West Point Disciplined by Brigadier General Mills.

WEST POINT, N. Y., March 1.—The entire first class of cadets has been put under discipline by Brigadier General Mills, the superintendent of the Military academy, as a result of their insubordination during the absence of the superintendent in Cuba.

They will patrol the ordinary sentry posts and in addition will guard all corridors and entrances of the cadet barracks. No excuse of having had regard duty to do will be accepted as a reason for any failure to attend prescribed lectures and classes.

CHINESE EMPRESS DEAD? Native Population Flees From Nanchang, Fearing Vengeance. HONGKONG, March 1.—It is reported here that the empress dowager is dead.

HOUSES FIRED BY MOB. State Troops Guard Streets of Springfield, O.

CITY IS FILLED WITH ARMED MEN. Attack Fanned on Dayton Jail, Where Negroes Dean and Ladd, Accused of Murdering a White Man, Are Confined.

SPRINGFIELD, O., March 1.—This city, lately the scene of mob violence, in which six houses were burned by rioters, is still in the throes of more excitement. Another mob formed, and the excitement was precipitated in East Main street by a crowd of fully 500 people in pursuit of a negro.

Only eighty members of the two local companies answered the call to turn out and quell the mob. Two years ago the condition was the same, and Major Kirkpatrick was court-martialed as a result.

Patrick, now under sentence of death for the murder of William Marsh Rice, the aged Texas millionaire. The district attorney asked the Houston chief of police what the reputation was of Joseph Jordan, T. J. Nerney, H. J. Moran, Robert and Fayette Lee, James Hordan and the rest of the Texas witnesses brought to New York by the Patrick lawyers.

Chief Ellis had the same answer for all of them. Their reputation, he said, was bad.
