HELD TO COURT

Athens—The hearing in the case of Isaac, Claude and Leroy Gosline, charged with the larceny of trees and a double bitted ax, was held before Justice Johnson this forenoon. They were held to court under \$100 each on the tree case, and Isaac and Claude were held under the same sum for the larceny of the ax.

ASK WITTE FOR PROTECTION.

Jews of Russia Fear Renewal of Massacres at Easter.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 8.—A deputation of Jews headed by M. Slietzberg and representing provincial committees for the assistance of sufferers by massacres laid a report of outrages before Premier Witte, at the same time directing his attention to the continuation of the anti-Jewish agitation among the Black Hundred and their threats against Jews if they acted with the progressive parties in the elections. The deputation expressed fears of a renewal of massacres at Easter and insisted that only an immediate proclamation of the government's firm intention to protect life and property of Jews and to severely punish their assailants would stop the evil.

Count Witte replied in a sympathetic vein and promised to bring the matter immediately before the cabinet. He declared that he fully realized the unfortunate position of Jews outside the law, adding that he was confident the national assembly would resolve the Jewish question justly.

He further advised participation in the election in order that where Jews are in the majority they might send representatives to the assembly.

THREE SHOT AT BOGOTA.

Rebels Who Attempted Life of General Reyes Suffer For Crime.

BOGOTA, Colombia, March 8.—The three men who attempted to assassinate General Reyes, the president of the republic of Colombia, were shot on the spot where the attack took place.

Complete calm prevails throughout the republic. President Reyes was shot at by three mounted men as he was out driving with his daughter. Eight revolver shots were fired, five of which struck the carriage, but the president and his daughter escaped unharmed.

The scene of the attempted assassination was near the Arzobispo bridge, in the suburbs of Bogota. After firing at the president the would be assassins rode away, but were subsequently captured.

Rathbone Seeks Vindication. COLUMBUS, O., March 8.—A joint resolution was introduced in both branches of the general assembly petitioning congress to grant an investigation of the claim of E. G. Rathbone, who was director of posts of Cuba under the United States provisional government, that he was deprived of his rights during his trial for the alleged misappropriation of funds of the postal department of the island. Rathbone was freed by the general proclamation of amnesty issued when the island was turned over to the Cuban republic by the United States.

Linevitch at Taarskoe-Selo. ST. PETERSBURG, March 8.—Emperor Nicholas received Lieutenant General Linevitch, former commander in chief of the army in Manchuria, at Taarskoe-Selo.
