## BRIDGE TO BE BUILT THIS SUMMER

### Bids for Steel and Concrete on Proposed New Structure at Towanda Will Be Closed March 24

It was announced this morning that bids for steel and concrete work for the new Lehigh Valley bridge at Towanda will be closed on March 24, and the contracts will probably be awarded in a week or ten days thereafter.

The eastern end of the new bridge will probably be located near the point where the present one now stands, but the west end will be considerably farther up the river. By constructing the bridge in this manner the heavy curve will be eliminated, a fact which will be greatly appreciated by the officials of the road, as it means an immense saving.

The upper Towanda station, however, will be torn down, and a new one erected at East Towanda. Whether this will be of advantage to those desiring to get in and out of Towanda remains to be seen.

It is quite probable that the new bridge and station will be constructed this summer, as there is every evidence that the officials of the Lehigh are planning to push the work along rapidly.

The bridge will be erected on the most approved plan and when completed will probably be one of the finest of its kind in the state. It is said that the Lehigh is also planning for a fine station.

## AUTO CARS FOR LEHIGH VALLEY

### May Possibly Be Run Over the Auburn and Ithaca Branch of That Road

According to an interview published in yesterday's Ithaca Daily Journal, if the Auburn & Ithaca Traction Company makes any move toward purchasing rails or ties, or shows by any tangible evidence that it is the intention to build a line between Ithaca and Auburn, the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company will immediately purchase two of the most remarkable cars in the world—a car that is a whole railroad system in itself—generating its own electric current, storing it automatically and using it for self propulsion as required. The car is known among railroaders as the "Strang gas electric." Railway men describe it succinctly as a combined coach and power on wheels.

A trip is now being made across the continent with one of these cars as an experiment. The cost of one is \$20,000.

Now that the Lehigh road has reason to believe that there will be competition from the Auburn & Ithaca Traction Company they are determined to protect their own interests and the outcome of the matter may be the purchase of two of these cars to place on the A. & I. branch.

## LEHIGH VALLEY IS REFUSED NEW TRIAL

### The Verdict Recently Rendered in the Hoodmacher Damage Case Is to Stand

The motion for a new trial in the case of Mary Hoodmacher and Florence M. Hoodmacher, widow and minor child of George B. Hoodmacher, against the Lehigh Valley railroad company, was denied yesterday and a new trial refused.

The plaintiffs were awarded \$7,000 damages in this case, which took a number of days to try. The victim of the accident met his death in Warren county, N. J., by the blowing up of an engine boiler owned by the Lehigh Valley. Hoodmacher was in the caboose of the train which was being pushed up a plane, when the boiler exploded and he met instant death.

The contention of the plaintiff company was that the Lehigh Valley was negligent in permitting a defective boiler in one of its engines.
