ITALIAN STILLETTO CAUSED SCATTERING

Boys Engaged in Tantalizing a Youthful Son of Italy Put to Rout

The long glittering blade of a stiletto in the hands of an infuriated Italian youth caused a scattering among a crowd of young fellows who engaged in tantalizing the foreigner on Desmond street late last night, and before the rout was finished a window in one of the big trolley cars was smashed with a missile of an unknown character, the conductor narrowly escaped being hit, and one of the youths who had taken to his heels and later sought refuge in the trolley received a blow which nearly knocked him out of his seat.

Between 10 and 11 o'clock a crowd of young men, exhilarated from having received their pay checks, congregated at the corner of Desmond and Lockhart streets. An Italian, not yet out of his teens, came along, when the crowd began to tantalize him. At first the low browed, dark-skinned son of Italy was frightened, but as the crowd pursued he seemed to gain courage, and after he had been chased across the street he suddenly turned about, drew a stiletto from his pocket, brandished it in the air for a moment and proceeded to charge his pursuers. Then there was a scattering of feet and the crowd retreated in double quick time. One of the young men who was not as fleet of foot as his companions sought refuge in a trolley car which was on the point of starting toward Waverly. He rushed inside, seated himself in one of the chairs, and a second later the now thoroughly enraged Italian hurled something through the window. There was a crash of glass, the conductor who was standing in the aisle ducked his head, and the young man in the seat is said to be wearing a discolored optic as a result of coming in contact with the object thrown by the Italian. No arrests have as yet been made.

FREELAND FIREMAN BADLY INJURED

Scalded With Steam in a Collision of Two Engines

Two Lehigh Valley engines collided in a very peculiar manner at Avoca yesterday morning and one of the firemen, George O'Boyle of Freeland, was badly scalded and the locomotives were slightly damaged. It appears that one engine was standing in a switch, while the second was passing by. It was discovered that the locomotive was not in far enough, and as a result many of the pipes on the outside of the boiler were knocked off, and it so happened that the fireman was only a short distance away and he was scalded by escaping steam. He is scalded so badly that he may not recover.

The collision delayed traffic over the cutoff for some time, and the road bed was considerably damaged.

THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS WANTED

Lehigh Valley Made Defendant in Two Damage Suits Yesterday

Two suits in trespass were commenced yesterday against the Lehigh Valley by Wilkes-Barre residents. Anthony W. Smith and Mary Smith, both of Wilkes-Barre, sue for damages caused by an accident in January last. The Lehigh Valley operates a switch or branch road running from the main tracks to the plaintiff's residence. On January 25 last, it is alleged that the employees of the company recklessly and carelessly ran the cars so that they went over the switch terminus and crashed into the residence of the Smiths. It is claimed that Mrs. Smith was terribly frightened and sustained a severe shock. She sues for \$15,000 damages and her husband will be satisfied with \$5,000.

HIS NEW POSITION

The many friends of H. E. Cunningham, formerly editor of The Daily Record, will be interested to learn that he has resigned an editorial position on the Malone, N. Y., Evening Telegram, to accept a position as instructor in the department of German of the University of Vermont. VALLEY BRAKEMAN KILLED

Jeremiah Mahoney, a Lehigh Valley brakeman, disappeared from his train near Easton last night. Mahoney's body was found in the Lehigh river 200 feet below the railroad bridge at about 11 this morning. There was a gash in the back of the head, caused either by a blow from a blunt instrument or by the body striking the bridge in falling. There is an air of mystery about the case and it is intimated that the brakeman may have met with foul play. He went to work last evening after having received a letter from a woman friend. The woman, it is said, is married.

WAS ACTING SUSPICIOUS

Charles Gregory, who claims Wilkes-Barre as his home, and who says that he came to Sayre to obtain work, was picked up by Constable John Haas last night, but after spending some time in the lockup was released. Gregory was acting in a suspicious manner, and as the men in the shops have been missing tools for some time past, it was deemed wise to take him into custody. As there was no evidence, however, that he had disturbed anything he was released.

HOSPITAL TO HAVE X-RAY MACHINE

Negotiations Are Under Way for the Purchase of One for That Institution

When negotiations which are now under way are finally consummated the R. A. Packer hospital at this place will have one of the finest and most complete X-Ray machines that modern science can produce. For some time the officials of that institution have been contemplating the installation of one of these machines, and recently steps have been taken by which one will be secured.

On Saturday last Dr. H. S. Fish went to Philadelphia for the purpose of investigating the merits of the various machines on the market and although the kind has not been definitely determined upon as yet it can be stated to a certainty that the machine selected will be of the most approved pattern and will be equipped with all the modern appliances. A noted expert on X-Ray machines will probably be consulted before a machine is definitely determined upon. As the matter stands at the present time, however, negotiations have gone far enough so that selecting the machine is all that remains to be done. It is expected that the machine will be installed within the coming six weeks.

HIS STORY WAS FALSE

William Morgan, a Pittston man who furnished the editor of the Gazette of that place false information on which the editor wrote a story and published the same in his paper, has come to grief and is now languishing behind prison bars awaiting trial on a charge of furnishing false information to a newspaper. Morgan, who had fallen down stairs and injured himself, told the newspaper man that he had been set upon by ruffians and brutally treated. The newspaper man told the chief of police and the official suspicioning that all was not right interviewed Morgan and finally forced him to admit that the story he had told was a lie.

Furnishing false information to the representative of a newspaper is a serious offense and is punishable by both fine and imprisonment.
