The Paris municipal authorities are extending their street lighting trials with 'lusol, a hydrocarbon recovered as a by-product in making blast-furnace coke. The light is said to be even softer than that from alcohol; and a 100-candle lamp of the type hitherto employed costs only a farthing per hour while the domestic lusol lamp gives double the light at half the cost of a good paraffin .emp. One great use of the new illuminant will be to form a reserve in case of unforeseen gas or electric light extinction.
