CRUEL ELEPHANT HUNTERS

Deadly Method Employed by Natives in Capturing East African Animals.

A correspondent of the London Times writes of elephant hunting in Africa: "The most deadly method of killing elephants, and that most frequently employed by the natives of East Africa, is the pit, sufficient deep—roughly 20 feet—long and wide to engulf and hold an elephant. After a period of frantic struggling, hunger and exhaustion the wretched animal is done to death by native spears. If the size and powers of the animal are remembered, it is difficult to imagine a more revolting, brutal picture of torture; but this is the common practice of the natives of the country and is being enacted daily throughout British territory.

"A priest had taken out a sportsman's license (\$250) with the object of building a church in the event of his hunting venture being successful. He shot a fine elephant with heavy tusks, and while he was examining the animal natives appeared and claimed the tusks; the elephant belonged, they said, to their chief, Maquenda. To clinch their claims they asserted that the elephant had been lame and pointed to a festering opening in the sole of one of its feet, extending up the leg.

ELECTED AT WAVERLY

A Large Vote Was Polled and Everybody Was Apparently Satisfied With the Results

Waverly—The Waverly Republicans by strenuous and systematic work rolled up a substantial majority for their ticket at the village election yesterday. When the special cars came up from Sayre at 5 o'clock the election board had their hands full but were equal to the occasion and in 30 minutes 128 votes were cast.

904 ballots were cast, 259 of which were for the Republican ticket, 135 for the Union ticket, 474 were split, 27 were defective, and the remainder were blank.

Four Italians who did not have the necessary naturalization papers attempted to vote but were challenged.

Every carriage in Waverly and some from Sayre were busy all the afternoon getting out the vote.

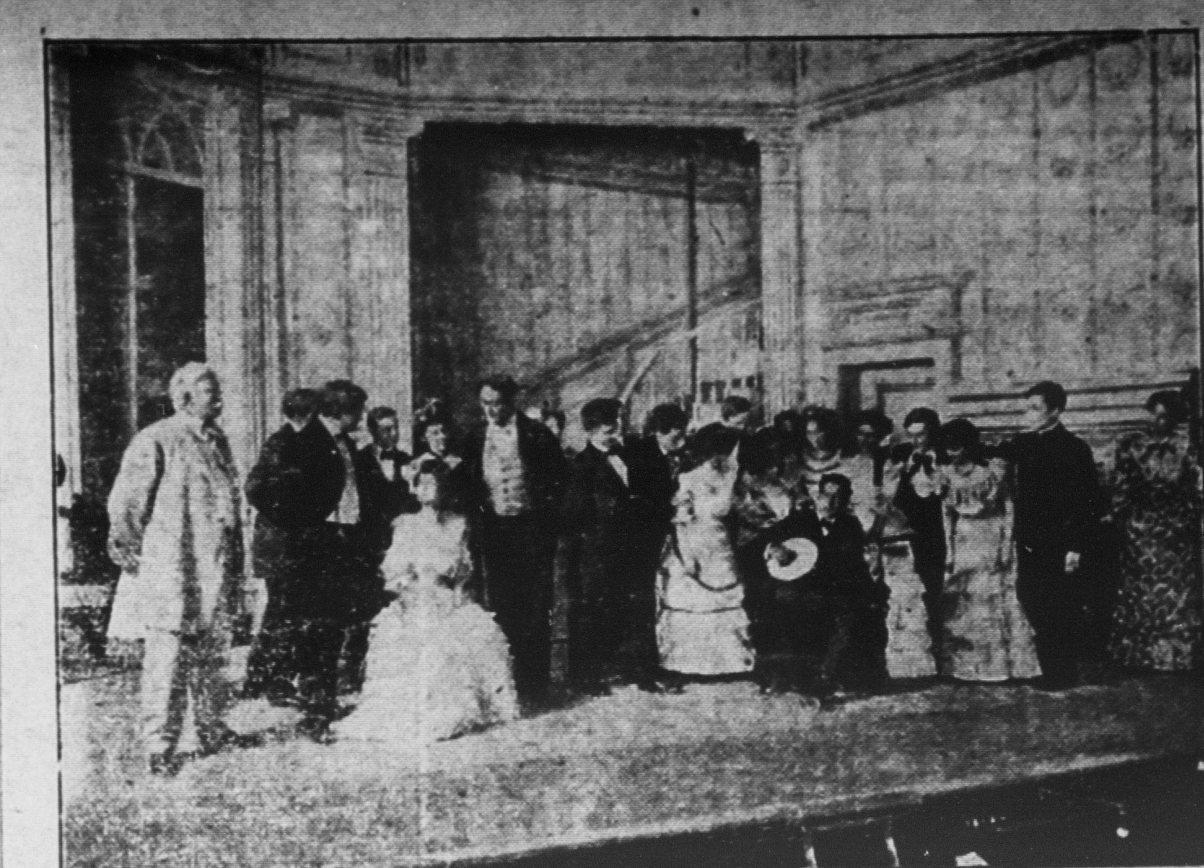
