TWO BODIES WASHED ASHORE. Schooner Lady Antrim Wrecked Off Marblehead Neck. MARBLEHEAD, Mass., March 21.—Small fragments of the Boothbay (Me.) schooner Lady Antrim were found strewn along the outside of Marblehead neck, off which she was wrecked.

The vessel was so completely smashed up that it was some hours after the wreckage had been discovered that her identity was learned. The bodies were found high upon the beach.

The Lady Antrim was a two masted schooner of eighty-three tons burden. She was built at Edeonon, N. C., in 1857 and was owned and commanded by J. H. McClintock of Boothbay Harbor, Me., who, it is thought, was one of the victims of the wreck.
