Large Volume of Business Transacted at Last Night's Session

Athens-The regular meeting of the borough council was held last evening, all of the members being present except Keefe. President Weller presented the names of the standing committees for the year which were approved by vote of the council.

C. C. Yocum, Esq, appeared be fore the council and stated that Mr. Evans and himself were attorneys for Mrs. Nicholson in her claim against the borough for damages to her property; that judgment had been awarded in her favor to the amount of \$500 October 10, 1904. and that Mr. Maynard, a former attorney for the borough, had applied for a rule to have the judgment stricken off, which the court had refused. He was present at this time to make a demand for the money, which he now did, and hoped that the council would take such action and stop further litiga-

Mr. Mills, borough attorney, reolied that what Mr. Yocum had stated was correct and that plaintiff could issue a mandamus to compel payment, but he said the borough had a remedy and he did not think it advisable to take any action in the matter; that at the proper time he would inform the council of his reasons. No action was taken.

A large number of bills were then presented and ordered paid.

The annual report of the Board of Health was then read by the secretary. This was a most carefully compiled report giving a full account of the business transacted and an exhaustive description of the sanitary conditions of the borough. The report shows that the persons representing this official in Smithfield, returning home last board have entered upon the work night. with a determination to give the closest and most intelligent scrutiny to the work. As a consequence there have been fewer cases of infectious disease and less mortality than there has ever been in any previous year. There are five members and each one has the supervision of particular districts, who with the aid of the medical officer has a general oversight of the sani tary conditions under their charge. It is advised that a sanitary officer be appointed who shall receive a salary, and that he be required to make an inspection of the cesspools at such times as may be determined, and that he report to the health officer. The term of Charles E. Finch expires in April, 1906, and he was reappointed on the board.

Mr. Clark, of the special committee on the conditions at the gas works, stated that he had waited upon the manager and stated his business and that they had informed him that they had disconnected their apparatus from the sewer and that there could be no further contaminations from that source. Dr. Stevens also reported that he had visited the works in person and found that they had no connection with the sewer. Mr. Nevins visited the plant today and was shown where the trap has been

Dr. Stevens also reported that there had been complaints in the upper part of town that the connection from the Furniture works and Imperial Tool works were not in proper condition. The conditions near Spruce street are chargeable to the imperfect catch basins made necessary by the surrounding ground.

The matter of a subway at the Lehigh Valley crossing was discussed. Mr. Mills stated that Superintendent Kinney of the railroad company and Mr. Case of the trolley company were both anxious to have it and would bear their share of the expense. The matter of the extension of Wheelock avenue through to Main street was presented. Charles F. Kellogg presented a map of the proposed extension. Action was suspended to a future date.

In relation to the guard rail on theChemung river bank, Dr. Stevens reported that in consultation with Street Commissioner Mulligan he learned that a three-board fence would cost about \$40.

Mr. Nevins of the finance committee reported a deficiency from last year of about \$1,000 and that it would be necessary to economize. He was authorized to prepare an economic and annual budget and report at next meeting.

M. J. Burke, agent for the Eureka Hose Company, showed specimens of fire hose. Council voted to purchase 750 feet at 65c a foot, to be paid for September 5, 1906. The hose is guaranteed to stand a pressure of 500 pounds and to last in good condition five years; any failure to be made good by new hose.
