### DEPUTY PRESIDENT ADDRESSED EAGLES

The Local Organization Listened to a Highly Interesting Talk Last Night

The regular semi-monthly business meeting of the Sayre Aerie of Eagles was held in their rooms last night and was of considerably more than ordinary interest on account of the visit of Deputy Worthy State President Jesse Hedrick, who was present and delivered a decidedly instructive address which was much enjoyed by those present. Mr. Hedrick gave a complete history of the order of Eagles from the time it was first organized down to the present day. He took occasion to speak in the most flattering terms of the local organization and of the rapid strides it had made since its formation more than a year ago. He also complimented the degree team for the excellent manner in which the work of installing the Towanda Aerie was performed. A large number of candidates were to have been initiated last night but on account of the visit to Towanda the night previous the initiatory ceremonies were postponed until the next meeting. Twenty applications for membership were received.

### ACED WOMAN DEAD

Miss Sarah Stevens died last night at 11 o'clock at the home of her niece, Mrs. W. B. Weeks, of No. 101 North East street. Death was due to stomach trouble.

The deceased would have been 80 years old on the second of next month, and had resided with her niece for the past ten years. She was born at Standing Stone, and was a woman of estimable character. She is survived by one brother, Smith Stevens of Sayre, and two sisters, Mrs. E. M. Bishop of Boston, and Mrs. Leonard Irvine of this place. Two nieces, one of whom resides at Towanda, and the other in Cleveland, Ohio, also survive. The funeral arrangements which are in charge of Grumme's undertaking establishment, will be announced later.

### CONTRACTOR DOLAN HERE

Contractor John F. Dolan, who did the excavating for the new Lehigh Valley shops at this place, was a Sayre visitor yesterday, and left for Towanda this morning where he will look over the ground preparatory to commencing work on the contract which he has secured in connection with the erection of a new bridge and a change of the main line at that place. Mr. Dolan was accompanied in Sayre by Frank S. Higgins, formerly a book keeper for Mutchler & Sons, who also did a large amount of contract work on the new shops here. Mr. Higgins is now employed by Dolan and will do the time keeping at Towanda.

### DASTARDLY DEED

The timely discovery, yesterday morning, by a train crew of a stone wedged tightly between the rails of a switch on the mountain cutoff of the Lehigh Valley probably prevented an eastbound freight train from meeting with a serious wreck. The crew was going toward Coxton when they discovered the stone, which had the appearance of having been placed between the rails by a person or persons with the intention of causing a wreck. The perpetrators of the deed are unknown.

### EXCELLENT CONCERT

### TRACK FOREMEN WENT ON STRIKE

Were Out one Day but Didn't Get Their Raise

The track foremen employed on the Auburn & Ithaca and Lehigh & New York branches of the Lehigh Valley went out on a strike on Monday last having as their cause that "the pay was too small," and demanding a raise from \$45 a month to \$50. In all there were 53 foremen who refused to see that the various section gangs under their control drove spikes and tamped ties, but 49 of the 53 were ready to resume work on Tuesday morning. The men, however, did not win their point. The remaining four men obtained work elsewhere and are therefore no longer in the service of the Lehigh Valley. In just what manner the 49 men were settled with is not known, as the officials of the road will not give out any information. It is said, however, that they did not receive the wages asked for.

### TOWANDA MINSTRELS

The Towanda Minstrels will appear at Hale's Opera House, Towanda, on Tuesday evening, April 17, for the benefit of the Towanda High School Athletic Association. Those in charge of the entertainment promise a finished, up to date minstrel performance. There will be a double ring of 40 of the best male singers in Towanda, with six end men and two premiers. As specialties there are six buck and wing dancers, two monologue artists, trick bicycle rider and a sketch. McHenry's orchestra of ten pieces will furnish the music. The cast is being drilled by J. Otto Vanhuff, a young man about 18 years of age, who claims to reside at Covert, N. Y., met with a painful accident in the Lehigh yards at this place about 11 o'clock this forenoon. Vanhuff was beating his way over the Lehigh going east, and when the freight train on which he was riding reached Sayre, he had occasion to jump off. In landing his right foot caught in a frog and wrenched so badly as to cause a compound fracture of the ankle joint. The ambulance was summoned and he was taken to the hospital.

### COLLIDED WITH A TROLLEY CAR

The Wagon Was Demolished but the Man and Horse Escaped Unhurt

John Wheatley, the well known Lehigh Valley engineer, while out driving last night was run into by a trolley car, escaping himself, but the wagon in which he was seated is a wreck. The accident occurred between Athens and Sayre shortly after 6 o'clock. Mr. Wheatley was crossing the trolley tracks and had waited for one of the northbound cars to pass. When he drove on to the tracks he did not notice a second car closely following the first one. The second car struck the wagon before the motorman could stop. Mr. Wheatley was thrown from the vehicle but was not injured. The wagon, however, was badly smashed.

Lehigh Valley engine 583, recently overhauled, has again been placed in service on the locals between Mt. Carmel and Lehighton.

Mrs. Ella Battin of Overton, Mrs. Stephen Hazen of Sayre, and John Giles of Tioga Center, underwent operations at the hospital this forenoon.

Engineer E. H. Shipman of Sayre will have charge of the new construction work to be done by Contractor Dolan for the Lehigh at Towanda.

Passenger traffic on the Lehigh Valley at the present time is heavy. Foreigners who are departing for the West Virginia soft coal fields are contributing daily to the big rush.

David Swank, a Lehigh Valley engineer, who resides at Hazleton and who was sent to the State hospital the latter part of December with a crushed heel, has been discharged from that institution.

Alfred Walter, formerly president of the Lehigh Valley railroad company, has been selected as president of the seaboard air line railway, one of the great trunk lines to Florida and the South.

The duck season which opened on April 1 will close on April 15. Time was when there was considerable duck shooting in this section but in recent years the birds have evidently sought another stopping place.

M. K. Tully yesterday caused the arrest of two men whom he claims threatened his life. The men were arraigned late yesterday afternoon charged with surety of the peace and will be given a hearing this evening.

Harry Evans, son of I. N. Evans, the well known attorney, has sold his farm in Smithfield and will remove to Worcester, Mass., next week where he will in the future reside. He has been on the Smithfield farm for the past fifteen years.

The strike situation seems no nearer settlement than when the men ceased work on Monday last. The miners now propose to submit the differences between themselves and the operators to arbitration. In the meantime the public will continue to foot the bills.
