MRS. JACOB LAUX DIED YESTERDAY

She Was the Wife of the Well Known Engineer and Had Been a Resident of Sayre for Many Years

Mrs. Mary Laux, wife of Jacob Laux, the well known Lehigh Valley engineer, died at her home on North Elmer avenue, last night, at 6:30 o'clock, after an illness of two years' duration of Bright's disease. For the past eight months' her condition had been serious, but it was not considered critical until a few hours previous to her death.

The deceased was born in Pittston September 27, 1857, and her maiden name was Mary Hess. She was married to Jacob Laux April 25, 1875, and with her husband came to Sayre 27 years ago. For twenty years they resided on North Lehigh avenue, but for the past seven years have lived on North Elmer avenue. She was a woman of most estimable character, a devout christian and kind wife and mother. During her long residence in Sayre she had acquired a host of friends who will regret her death. Besides her mother, Mrs. Minnie Laux, she is survived by the following relatives: Four daughters, Mrs. John McMahon, Mrs. T. J. O'Neil, Mrs. M. J. Farrell, Miss Emma Laux, all of Sayre; one son, Leo, also of Sayre, and four sisters, Mrs. Joseph Hick of Auburn, Mrs. George Fleischer and Mrs. John Morgan of Pittston, and Mrs. Augustus Menzel of Alton, Pa.

The funeral will be held from the Church of the Epiphany on Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock. P. H. O'Shea has charge of the arrangements.

LEHIGH SAID TO BE SERIOUSLY AFFECTED

Coal Situation Will Probably Cause Cessation of Much Activity

According to a dispatch sent out from New York the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, as a result of the present situation in the anthracite fields, has ordered a cessation of all improvement work which can safely be postponed, and in addition, has taken steps to cut down in every way possible the expenses of the road until such time as normal operating conditions prevail in the anthracite fields.

The officials of the road, it is asserted, have taken this step in order to be prepared for a long continued strike, should negotiations between miners and operators fail to result in agreement. It is a well known fact that over half of the Lehigh's earnings are derived from the mining and transportation of anthracite, and the closing down of the mines means, therefore, the loss of a very large part of the company's business.

In connection with this order, it is also stated, that the operating force of the company will be reduced in keeping with the decrease in business. How far this order will affect Sayre remains to be seen. At present there is no indication that there will be a shut down here. None of the train crews have thus far been laid off and the shop men are working fairly good time. The men in the old shops were laid off on Friday night but work will again be resumed on Monday morning. The lay off, however, was not caused by the coal situation, but because of the fact that repair work has been caught up.

The work of changing the company's line at Towanda and the building of a new bridge and station at that place will probably proceed as usual, as part of the contracts have been let and some of the preliminary work is already under way.
