Hanover Hornpipe ran second, with Zany third. The finish was sensational, Mettle beating Hanover Hornpipe by less than a head.

In the sixth race Bellanicker was the 1 to 2 favorite and with a good rider ought to have won. He was nosed out in the last half dozen yards by Jack McKeon, both horses being ridden out. T. S. Martin easily took third money.
