Forty-one years ago today witnessed the final collapse of the great rebellion and the surrender G E. Hulett has moved into of General Lee's army. Time does the J. H. General Phil Sheridan after giving Jubal Early his final polishing off in the valley was made chief in command of the force to make a detour around Petersburg and strike the Mrs. Alice Wheeler went to south side of Danville railroads to Towarda today to visit her mother, cut off the supplies to the rebel army from Richmond.
