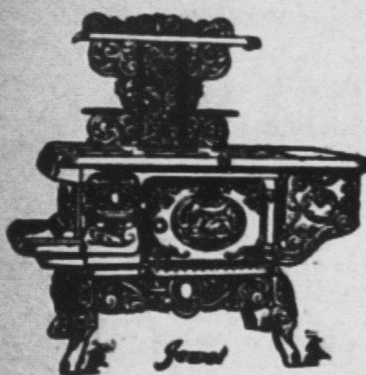

LEHIGH OFFICIALS ARE AFTER TRAIN RIDERS

Large Number Were Arrested on Last Sunday and the Pernicious Practice Must Stop

The Lehigh Valley officials are bound to break up illegal train riding. Recently orders were issued to the special officers to see that persons not entitled to ride on trains were arrested and dealt with according to law. On last Sunday wholesale arrests were made at Rockdale. Officers were stationed at that place and while the train stopped long enough to take water the cars were searched and every body on them except the train's crew were nabbed. Sixteen men were taken in custody and later safely landed in the Allentown jail. Five of the 16 were from Lehigh ton, two from Allentown, two from Bethlehem and four from Easton. The balance are knights of the road. The Lehigh ton men had been to Allentown and were on their way home. The men will be given hearings on the charge of illegal train riding. The penalty in case of conviction is a fine not exceeding five dollars or ten days in the county jail.

At this season of the year railroad men are greatly annoyed by tramps and young men who appear to think that they have a perfect right to ride trains whether they have permission or not. Especially on Sundays young men between the age of 15 and 20 will leave their homes to take a free ride to some town a few miles distant from their own homes. The practice is a pernicious one and many fatalities have resulted, to say nothing of serious injuries and loss of limbs. The officials of the Lehigh Valley this spring will put forth a vigorous effort to break up train riding, and their efforts will have the hearty endorsement of all good citizens.

Among the important matters disposed of last night was the selection of a manager. H. C. Watrous, the well known clerk in the Citizen bank, Waverly, who has acted as treasurer for Manager Tobias for the past year, leased the house and will conduct the same next season. Although a young man, Mr. Watrous has had the benefit of and profited by first class business instruction, and it can be safely predicted that he will make a successful manager. He will give to the patrons of the house the privilege of witnessing attractions of a high order of merit, and will make many changes in the conduct of the theatre for the comfort and entertainment of those who patronize it. There were several applicants for this important post, making the competition decidedly strong.

WORTHY OF NOTE

The Record is pleased to note the appearance of the "Annual Statement" of Bradford county in a paper published in this end of the county. Last night's Evening News printed the statement. Heretofore it has been the tendency on the part of the commissioners to award the printing of the statement to weekly papers, for past political services, whose circulation in this end of the county has been of a limited nature. Therefore the residents of Sayre and Athens have not been given the opportunity to see what has been going on with reference to the handling of the people's money by the county officials. The commissioners are to be congratulated upon awarding the statement to a paper in this section, evidently entirely ignoring political reasons.

WILL PRAY FOR SUCCESS

Councilmen G. W. Heverley and C. C. West and N. F. Walker, borough engineer, are in Harrisburg today conferring with the State Department of Health with reference to the proposed sewer system for Sayre. A request will also be formulated and presented to the governor to allow the sewage to be emptied into the Susquehanna river at this place. All citizens who are interested in the health of the borough of Sayre will hope that the committee may be successful in its undertaking.

ITALIAN LABORERS GO OUT ON STRIKE

Lehigh Didn't Furnish Cars Enough and Men Lay Down Their Tools and Quit

Just because the Lehigh Valley failed to furnish a sufficient number of cars for them to ride back and forth to work, a gang of nearly one hundred Italians went out on a strike at Rummerfield yesterday. The men recently left Sayre and went to Rummerfield to work on the stone ballast which the Lehigh is putting in near that place. They were in charge of Matthew Cleary of Sayre, who has the reputation of getting along in a first-class manner with the men under him. The Lehigh has been furnishing four freight cars for carrying the men to and from their work, but on Monday afternoon it appears that one of the cars was needed for another purpose, so yesterday morning instead of there being four cars to carry the men there were only three. Instantly there were signs of revolt, and finally when they were told by the boss to get into the cars, they flatly refused and laid down their tools. They claim that three cars did not furnish sufficient room for the gang, and rather than ride in a crowded condition they threw up their jobs. The remainder of the day the men hung about the railroad and uttered many threats, but as the officials of the company would grant no concessions, the men will be paid off and discharged today.

Special Officers Doty and Johnson of Sayre went to Rummerfield this afternoon carrying with them pay checks for the men. They will also carry divers and sundry firearms in case the obstreperous foreigners get gay. It is thought, however, that the men will be settled with without difficulty.

LOCAL MENTION

The strike is now ten days old and the miners and operators are as far from settling their differences as ever. The prospects for a continuance of the struggle are excellent. Both sides remain firm and so does the price of coal.

The board of health has secured permission from the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to dump garbage on their land below the Sayre Brewing Company's plant. A cove is situated at this point and the garbage must be dumped into it.

Despite the wet, gloomy weather, the grass is growing rapidly and the buds are beginning to shoot forth. The springtime "has come," the robins and blue birds are here, and all that is needed to make it thoroughly enjoyable is the warm rays of the sun.

The state police are after men who kill robins. Yesterday afternoon two Italians who were killing robins and blue birds near Wilkes-Barre were arrested and in default of bail were sent to the county jail. The penalty for killing robins or song birds is a heavy one and offenders have little opportunity for escape if the charge against them is proven.
