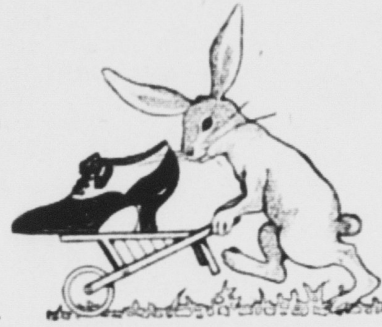

**MRS. SARAH JACKSON**

Athens—Mrs. Sarah Jackson died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Margaret MacMorran, North Main street, at about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon of infirmities of old age. She was born in Philadelphia February 6, 1813, and was married to John M. Jackson Feb. 3, 1837. They resided in Athens township at the breaking out of the civil war and her husband enlisted as a private in Company E, 141st Regiment Pennsylvania Volunteers August 16, 1862, and was promoted to First Lieutenant for meritorious service. Their only son, Edward M. Jackson, also served in the same command and in Randolph's Battery. In the winter of 1862, after the battle of Fredericksburg Mrs. Jackson went to the front and gave her untiring energies to care for the sick and wounded soldiers. She was like a ministering angel to the suffering boys who were enduring every privation in the dark days that accompanied that campaign, and she saved many heroic men who would not have lived had it not been for her care. Her husband received the wound at Chancellorsville from the effects of which he died in 1888. She has been a noble woman and many hearts have been made glad through her ministrations. Two children survive her, Edward M. Jackson of Caldwell, N. J., and Mrs. Margaret MacMorran of Athens.

Her funeral will take place from her late residence at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, Rev. W. H. Sawtelle officiating, and her remains will be buried in Tioga Point cemetery, Rogers & Miller having charge of the interment.

**CONE WEST**

Athens—Chester E. McKinney has started for the west in hopes of regaining his health. He will spend the summer with his son at Flagstaff, Ariz., and will incidentally visit the Grand Canyon, Phoenix, and several other western places of interest. In Australian Parliament. It is the rule in the Australian parliament that the speeches of every member must be reported verbatim.
