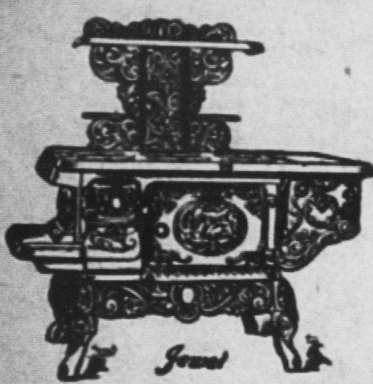

CHARRED BONES FOUND IN RUINS

Human Being May Have Been Burned in Fire on Lloyd Place on Sunday Morning Last

Pieces of charred and blackened bones, which have every appearance of being of the human variety, were yesterday found in the ruins of the barn which burned on the Lloyd place on Sunday morning last. The bones were found underneath a pile of oats which have been smouldering since the morning of the fire. The discovery was made yesterday afternoon by one of the Werts brothers, who occupy the place as tenants. Yesterday afternoon he was digging into the pile of half-burned oats when his attention was attracted by several objects which had every appearance of being bones.

The oats previous to the fire were stored in a bin on the second floor of the barn, and when the building collapsed the oats tumbled from the bin on top of a pair of stairs which connected the second floor of the barn with the ground floor of a shed which was built on the side of the barn. Upon making the discovery Mr. Werts' suspicions were at once aroused, as the cattle and horses which were burned in the barn were in another part of the building, and he immediately surmised that they must be human bones.

On the morning of the fire, shortly after the flames were discovered, three men, probably tramps, were seen to leave the barn, and after reaching the Lehigh tracks walked hurriedly away. It is believed now that the bones found yesterday may be those of a fourth man who with the others had occupied the barn on the night previous for sleeping purposes.

Another theory which has been advanced, but which has not been given much credence, is that a murder was committed in the barn and that the building was set fire to cover up evidence of the crime. The bones will be given to an expert today for examination.

LEHIGH'S NEW BRIDGE

The new bridge which the Lehigh Valley is to build at Towanda will be 1,801 long and will form a reversed curve. Starting just a little north of the east end of the present bridge it will curve to the north, then a stretch to the south, and then toward the north at the west end. There will be fourteen spans, 130 feet in length. The 13 piers will be 33 feet above the foundation and will be nine feet and six inches wide at the top and 42 feet long. The base of the piers will be 11 feet wide and 52 long. The entire cost of building the bridge, including the removal of old bridge, will be nearly a quarter of a million.

LAD'S EYES INJURED

DeWitt Balckman of South Elmer avenue has a little boy six or seven years old and yesterday afternoon while the lad was playing with another youngster the latter threw a handful of dirt which he picked from the ground into the boy's face. The dirt proved to be partly lime and particles of the stuff entered the Blackman lad's eyes. The boy shrieked with pain and later was taken to the hospital. At first it was feared that the lad's eyes had been permanently injured but at the hospital today the physicians say that he will recover without the loss of sight in either eye.

The girl informed her mother and when the latter appeared the tramp had changed his mind about wanting food and insisted upon being given a dime to slake his thirst at a drink emporium. The woman of the house had evidently dealt with tramps before and she telephoned for the chief of police. The latter put in appearance but the tramp had vanished. Later the chief spied his man passing through the park. He placed him under arrest but as the man was suffering from a bad abscess on the hand the chief took him to the hospital instead of the lockup.

SANITARY CAUTION

The approach of warm weather has increased the activity of those entrusted with the state health department affairs. Notices have been sent to every section of the Commonwealth by Commissioner of Health Dixon urging all to take such steps as will be conducive to sanitary ends. When the frost leaves the ground large quantities of matter held in check by the ice will putrefy and vitiate the air. This is exceedingly productive of typhoid, and it is essential that the utmost caution should be taken to keep public places and residences clean and free from all contagion inviting influences.

ITALIAN STRIKERS

Special Officers Doty and Johnson went to Rummerfield yesterday afternoon and settled with the Italians who went on a strike on the day previous. It was expected that there would be trouble experienced in paying the men off, as they had been muttering considerably since laying down their tools. They received their checks, however, in a quiet manner, and when told that their services were no longer required by the Lehigh took the matter quite good naturedly. Their places will be filled by other men who are already on their way to Rummerfield to begin work.

TWO FINGERS OFF

Leslie Palmer, an employe of the machine shops, met with an unfortunate accident while operating a lathe yesterday afternoon. In some unknown manner he got his right hand caught in the gearing of the lathe and injured the forefinger and middle finger of the hand that it was necessary to amputate the first finger at the first joint and the middle finger at the second joint. He went to the hospital for treatment. He will be compelled to lay off duty for several days.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT WILL APPROVE PLANS

Provided Milltown, East Side and Northern Section of Sayre are Included in Sewer Proposition

Messrs. Heverly, West and Walker, who on Tuesday night went to Harrisburg for the purpose of taking up the Sayre sewer question with the State Department of Health, returned home early this morning. They are more than pleased with the result of the conference and it is expected that the matter will soon assume tangible form. The visit of the gentlemen named to Harrisburg had a two-fold object. First it is necessary to get the approval of the Department of Health of the plans already prepared, and also a permit to empty sewage into the Susquehanna river. On the first proposition the department insists that Milltown, the east side and the northern part of the borough shall be included in the sewer district before the plans will be approved. In order to dispose of this matter as quickly as possible it is quite likely that a special meeting of the council will be held for this purpose. The permission to empty the contents of the sewer into the Susquehanna will probably be granted. Although the department did not officially grant the request the committee were given to understand that they need have no uneasiness regarding this particular feature of the question. The permit, however, will be limited to a term of years, and at its expiration other means for disposing of the sewage will probably be devised. The committee should be congratulated upon the success of its visit to the department, and should have the unqualified endorsement of every resident of Sayre in further efforts which will of necessity have to be made in order to secure a sewer for Sayre.

GOOD FRIDAY SERVICE

A good Friday service will be held in the Presbyterian church tomorrow evening at 7:30 o'clock. As in other years the pastor has invited several other ministers to take part in the service. The speakers tomorrow evening will be Rev. Ira W. Hotaling of the Baptist church, Rev. A. F. von Tobel of the Athens Presbyterian church, and Rev. Arthur Dougal of the First Presbyterian church, Elmira. Each of these speakers will give a brief address on one of the "Words from the Cross." A cordial invitation is extended to all who have no other church engagement to attend this service.

LOOKING GLOOMY

If this kind of weather continues the opening of the trout season will be decidedly gloomy for sportsmen. The trout streams are nearly all running bank full and unless there is a radical change in the weather and rain ceases falling there will not be much doing when the season opens on Monday next. The Susquehanna river at this point has risen several feet in the past 24 hours, with strong probabilities of a further rise. The recent rains have caused the snow in the woods to melt rapidly and the effect is now just being noticed in the streams.

BALL GAME TOMORROW

The first ball game of the season in Sayre will be played on the Riverside diamond tomorrow afternoon. The Towanda High School team and a team from the Sayre high school will contest for supremacy, and the game promises to be a lively one as both teams are strong ones. An admission of ten cents will be charged, ladies free. The game will be called at 2:00 o'clock sharp. Despite the rains the diamond is in excellent condition and lovers of the national sport should not fail to attend.
