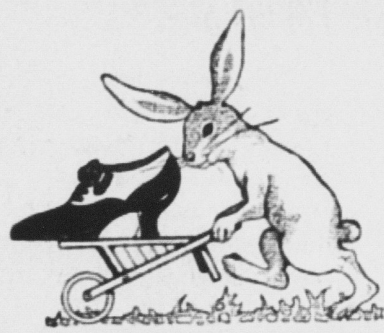

**PURE FOOD AGENT
CAUSES ARRESTS**

Athens Parties Alleged to be Handling Oleo in an Unlawful Manner

Athens—Robert M. Simmers, district agent of the department of agriculture and dairy and food commissioner was in Athens last week on the scent of persons in Milan and Athens who are dealing in oleomargarine in violation of the law. While taking dinner at Milan at a church entertainment the good ladies unconsciously thrust a piece of butterine under his nose, which he detected at once, and after testing it he decided there were culprits here. Tracing up his evidence he nailed some of the guilty parties at once and had them arrested. "Oleo Bill" Walker was brought before Justice Johnson and gave bail for his appearance this morning, when he claimed that he would be prepared with eminent council to defend himself. Edgar Dibble, residing on Chestnut street, Athens, was arrested as a dealer's agent who furnished the product to customers here.

At 10 o'clock this morning the Dibble case was called, District Attorney Mills appearing as council for the commonwealth and Hon. L. T. Hoyt for the defense. It was proven by W. H. Osborn, the Lehigh Valley agent here that packages of oleomargarine had been received from Brown & Fritz of Jersey city and delivered to Dibble who paid the freight. Mr. Simmers stated that he was appointed food commissioner by Governor Hastings in 1895 and had held the office ever since; that he had knowledge of all persons who were licensed to sell oleomargarine and that neither Dibble nor Brown & Fritz had any authority to sell it. He then went on to state his conversation with Dibble and his admissions in regard to the transaction. That he had received ten packages March 22, and disposed of part of it. The oleo was put up in ten pound packages and accompanying each package was a bottle of coloring matter.

Mrs. Carrie E. Baker, who keeps a boarding house at 103 Walnut street, was next called and stated that she purchased a ten pound package with one package of coloring matter; that they claimed that it was just as good as butter and that no one could tell the difference, for which she paid Dibble \$1.75. Mrs. C. F. Rider, Chestnut street, testified to having bought another package of Dibble, and Mrs. Carrie Northrup also testified to having purchased another package of Dibble and that she paid him for it.

During the proceedings a telegram was received from the department at Harrisburg stating that Braun & Fritz had no authority or license to sell oleomargarine in this state. This closed the case and Dibble was held under \$300 bail to answer to court, E. W. Selleck becoming his surety. The case of Walker was next called and as no defense was offered he was thereupon held under \$500 bond to appear at court. This is the second offense for Walker, he having been convicted for violation of the law five years ago, for which he was fined and imprisoned.

It may be well for those who keep boarding houses to know that they are liable to arrest if they use oleomargarine on their table unless they have notice to that effect pasted in their dining room. There are others in Athens who are known to have violated the law and other arrests may follow. Mr. Simmers states that the coloring matter used is poisonous and that no person can take it in their system without injury.

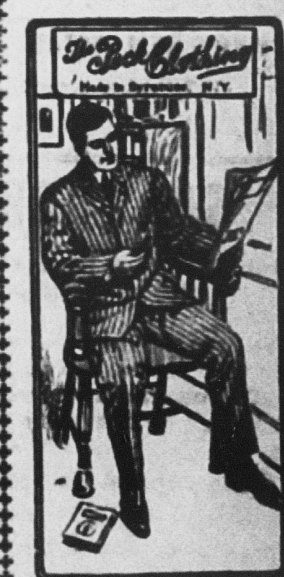
