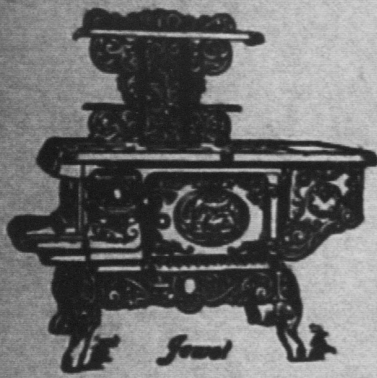

ACONITE CAUSED BRINK'S DEATH

Valley Fireman Took Overdose of the Drug This Forenoon, Which Results Fatally.

Coe M. Brink, a well known Lehigh Valley fireman, died suddenly this forenoon about 11:30 o'clock at his home No. 312 South Lehigh avenue, from the effects of an overdose of aconite. Just how he came to take the drug will probably never be known, but it is presumed that he had mistaken it for laudanum, with which latter drug he had been bathing an ulcerated tooth for several days.

A day or two ago Mr. Brink began to suffer severe pain in the side of his face, and he called Dr. C. J. Cummings. The physician advised him to poultice the face and diagnosed the condition as neuralgia arising from an ulceration at the root of a tooth. This morning Mr. Brink remained in bed nearly all the forenoon and about 11 o'clock his wife who was attending to her duties on the first floor heard her husband scream. She went to his room and found him in convulsions. She summoned Dr. Cummings and when the latter arrived he found Mr. Brink in a critical condition. Beads of perspiration were standing at every pore, and the heart action was decidedly weak.

Dr. Cummings sent for help and Dr. Dennison responded. The two physicians worked heroically and succeeded in strengthening the action of the heart but the respiratory organs had succumbed to the powerful drug and the man expired. A few minutes previous to death consciousness returned and he told Doctor Cummings that he had taken aconite. It is not believed, however, that he took the drug with suicidal intent, as during the night he had frequently bathed his face with laudanum, and it is thought that in the darkened room he got hold of the bottle containing aconite.

The wife of the deceased is prostrated with grief and was hardly able to tell the story of her husband's unfortunate demise. Brink has resided in Sayre several years and has been one of the Lehigh's best employes. He is survived by his wife and several brothers and sisters. He was about 35 years old. The arrangements for the funeral are not yet completed.

SAYRE DEFEATED IN YESTERDAY'S GAME

Towanda High School too Strong for the Local Ball Tossers

The game of ball on the Riverside diamond yesterday afternoon between the Sayre and Towanda high school teams resulted in a victory for the latter team, the score standing 7 to 12. The game was witnessed by a large crowd, the day being fine for the event. It was the first game of the season. Up until the ninth inning the home team had scored only two runs, while their opponents had rolled up ten runs. In the ninth, however, the home members of the aggregation recovered from the stage fright with which they had evidently been attacked in the early part of the struggle, and made five runs. The lead which the Towanda bunch had gained was too strong and the home team left the field defeated. The crowd was well pleased with the contest and a return game is soon to be played, probably at Towanda.

HORSE EXECUTED CIRCUS STUNTS

Turns Backward Somersault While Attached to Wagon, But No One is Injured

A white horse driven by an Athens business man executed almost a complete somersault in front of the Williams grocery yesterday afternoon, and although the wagon to which the animal was attached contained two occupants, a man and a woman, strange to say neither was injured. The rig was standing near the curb when it became frightened and began to rear on its hind legs. The driver's efforts to quiet the animal were in vain and suddenly it gave a leap in the air and fell over backwards into the mud. The woman leisurely climbed out of the wagon and when the driver saw that it was useless to try and control the animal he, too, jumped out. The animal fell squarely on its back and it required the services of eight men to get it to its feet. Nothing of any importance was broken, but the horse, which was a pure white changed color by coming in contact with the mud.

AT THEIR OWN EXPENSE

For the first time in years the men employed in the Lehigh shops at this place drew their pay on their own time. Heretofore the men have been allowed to draw their pay without loss of time. They were allowed to line up at pay window, given their checks, and the time thus lost was paid for by the company. Today, however, the men are not working, having been laid off since Thursday. Therefore they received their pay today at their own expense.

"LONG TOM" McASEY ON THE RAMPAGE

For the First Time in Many Moons He Kicks Up a Row in Sayre

The long, gothic frame of "Long Tom" McAsey, whose habitat has, since he first saw the light of day, been on the hills back of "Johnny-cake" (now Wiliwana), occupied one of the cells in the borough bastille last night. Officer Vogel and Constable Guy Hollon had considerable difficulty in getting Tom's abnormal length to fit the short, narrow cell, but after many efforts they succeeded, and Tom was left to slumber until this morning, when he paid a fine to Justice Gay for the privilege of being drunk about the borough streets last night and endeavoring to clean out the bar room at the Sayre house. It has been many moons since Tom's name has been on the police docket in Sayre. Years ago it was his weekly diversion to come to Sayre, load up with booze, and proceed to clean things up, but of late years Tom has given Sayre a wide berth, Athens and Waverly being his favorite places for indulging in distilled goods and cultivating the acquaintance of the police. Last night, however, he arrived in Sayre. It is said that he was comfortably jugged when he came, and in the early part of the evening he decided to clean house at the Sayre house. He attempted to make good, but ran up against the wrong bunch and was roughly ejected from the premises. Tom, however, is not accustomed to defeat, and when he discovered that he had been forced to retreat, resolved to make a last desperate charge. In the meantime Officer Voegel had been notified that there was a wild and woolly individual on the rampage and he went to the scene of the disturbance, accompanied by Officer Guy Hollon of Towanda, who was in Sayre on official business. The two minions of law and order grabbed Tom by the nape of the neck, and after much forcible persuasion, landed him in the bug-house.

McAsey entered the bar room, it is said, and raised a rumpus in short order. The bartender took exceptions, and as McAsey failed to keep quiet he was introduced to a piece of hose which is used to soothe toughs and other characters who do not conduct themselves in an orderly manner. After he had received several blows from the hose in the hands of the bartender McAsey was down and out. He was then pitched into the street, but returned again with the result already chronicled.
