RESIDENCE BADLY DAMAGED BY FIRE

Flames Caught from a Heating Stove and the Entire Fire Department is Called Out

Athens—Last evening at about 8:30 fire broke out in the Jacob H. Stickle residence, 206 Satterlee street, which called out the whole fire department. Mr. and Mrs. Stickle had gone out for the evening and the fire was not discovered until the flames burst out near the roof on the east side and the alarm was raised and Mr. Stickle was telephoned for. Delay in getting a stream on the fire, caused by the Main street hydrant at the bridge works being out of order, allowed the fire to gain such headway so that the joists in the upper story and east side of the building were nearly burned off. The household goods were very badly damaged though nearly all were removed to the next building. The \$500 insurance will not nearly cover the loss. The house will have to be almost rebuilt in order to make it habitable. The fire is thought to have started from a spark from the sitting room stove.

IN THE SENATE.

Rate Bill to Hold Attention of Congress This Week

WASHINGTON, April 16.—Speeches on the railroad rate bill were the feature in the senate today. Notwithstanding the assurances to the contrary which were given by senators there is no immediate prospect this week for securing an agreement upon a time for voting upon the bill. Senator Tillman has stated that Senator La Follette would probably be ready to proceed tomorrow, but the senator himself was not prepared to say whether he would do so. It is probable that the junior Wisconsin senator will be followed immediately by his colleague, Senator Spooner, who will devote his special attention to the points raised by Senator Bailey and will reply to the Texas senator's contention that congress has a right to limit the injunctive powers of the lower United States courts.

Statue to Franklin at Paris. PARIS, April 16.—A notable celebration will be held here on Friday on the occasion of the unveiling of a statue of Franklin near the site of the home he occupied when American minister to France. The statue is the gift of John B. Harjes, the American banker of Paris, to the municipality of this city and is a replica of the one now in front of the postoffice in Philadelphia. Ambassador McCormick will introduce the speaker of the occasion, Albert Houry Smyth, special representative of the United States for the Franklin bicentennial.

Revolt Against Morocco's Sultan. LONDON, April 16.—At El Arish, Morocco, a young relative of the sultan will shortly be proclaimed ruler in the south, and a formidable revolt against the Fez government is maturing at the city of Morocco.

FELL FROM MIDAIR.

New York Aeroplane Expert May Die From Broken Spine. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., April 15.—Israel Ludlow, the young New York attorney and aviator, fell more than 200 feet through the air, with the huge wings of the aeroplane folded over and plunging him in his position, and so badly injured his spine that his life is despaired of. In the one hope remaining to save it he is being rushed to New York.

The two lower vertebrae have been pushed out of alignment with the others, and Ludlow is paralyzed below the waist. Nevertheless he is cool and collected.

He has directed the making of arrangements for caring for himself upon his arrival in New York. Charles K. Hamilton, the aviator who made the ascension here, is traveling with Ludlow, and Ludlow's mother has been asked to meet the party in Richmond, though physicians here are extremely doubtful whether the injured man can survive the jar of the trip for that distance.

Two large automobiles, driven by men taking part in the automobile tournament here, had the big kite in tow, the aeroplanes being constructed so that it had twice the lifting power of the one used by Hamilton.

A strong south wind lifted the big kite easily, and in an instant, as though buried from a catapult, it ascended fully 250 feet. Then the hundreds of spectators on the beach heard the crash of the bamboo that told the story of the broken framework. An instant later they saw the front half of the kite lift, bend backward and fasten Ludlow in his seat, cutting off every opportunity he had of saving himself by climbing over the supports.

The kite, shorn of its lifting power, shot downward like a rock. Ludlow landed on the hard beach, striking squarely on the base of his spine. The upper portion of the aeroplane crashed down over the head of the helpless man. He was lifted out of the wreckage and carried to the Hotel Continental, where physicians examined his injuries. Ludlow was at once placed on a cot and taken to a train, and the journey northward, where the skill of specialists can be obtained, was begun. The injured man discusses the accident and keeps repeating: "I am so glad that no one was in it with me."

Meeting on Vasco da Gama. LISBON, April 16.—It is reported that while the Portuguese battleship Vasco da Gama was opposite here on the evening of April 13 there were unusual movements, cries, detonations and signals for help on board. The tug Aresan approached the vessel, but was fired upon and retired. They say that a lieutenant was killed by the crew of the vessel in revenge for the death of a sailor, who was killed by the lieutenant as he was trying to fire a cannon. The papers also say that the examination of the 483 mutineers of the cruiser Don Carlos, who mutinied April 12, is being held and that seven of them have already been sentenced to close confinement. The censorship is strict.
