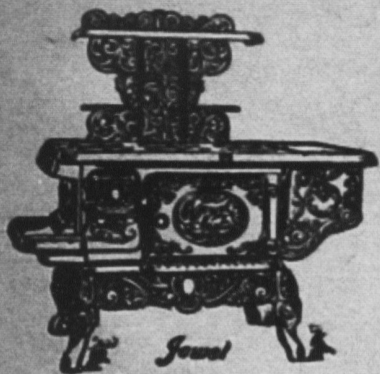

## ILLEGAL WHISKEY SELLING CHARGED

### Anti-Saloon League Commences Action against Sayre Hotel Keepers to Recover Penalties

Yesterday suits were commenced against the proprietors of the Park Hotel, the Brundage House, the Valley House and the Sayre House, by agents of the Anti-Saloon League of this state. The suits are to recover a penalty for the alleged selling of liquor on Sunday, and all the cases are returnable before Justice of the Peace Meredith of Towanda, on Wednesday next. The Anti-Saloon League has been particularly active throughout this section for some time past, and it is stated that several liquor dealers in Towanda have also been made defendants in actions of the same nature as those which the Sayre dealers will be called upon to defend. The law under which the process is issued was passed years ago, but it has never been repealed, is still in force. It provides that upon proper information being made before a justice of the peace in the case of a liquor dealer selling contrary to law, and providing a penalty therefore, a summons may be issued and such penalty recovered in the same manner as other debts. In the case of recovery the prosecutor is entitled to one-half of the penalty whatever it may be. In the meantime, however, the offender is not relieved of the criminal responsibility attached to the illegal selling and may be prosecuted at any time. The outcome of the cases against the Sayre hotel keepers will be watched with much interest.

The hotel men who have been served strenuously deny that they have been guilty of selling on Sunday and will contest the case to the finish.

## HONOLULU REPORTED SINKING INTO SEA

### Elmira Advertiser Prints An Uncertain Story to That Effect This Morning

This morning's Elmira Advertiser in a special edition prints the startling announcement that the city of Honolulu, Hawaii island, is gradually sinking into the sea and that the 25,000 inhabitants are lost. The Advertiser's story spread quickly about Sayre, and information concerning the new calamity was eagerly sought. Up to the hour of going to press the stock exchange at Waverly had received no news of the sinking of the island, nor had the Western Union at this place. The Advertiser's story was based on a wireless message which is said to have been received by a ship passing at a point several hundred miles distant from the island, but beyond this fact nothing is known.

The Waverly office of the Birmingham Press this afternoon is displaying a bulletin received by cable that two days ago the Sandwich Islands had experienced an earthquake shock lasting six minutes. A second cable message states that the shock did not consume so much time. The details as to whether the shock did any damage are missing.
