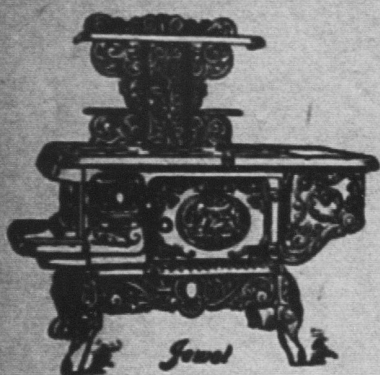

HENRY A. PRINCE KILLED AT ULSTER

Was Struck by Lehigh Valley Train No. 1 and Met Instant Death

Henry A. Prince of Towanda, one of the oldest and best known employes of the Lehigh Valley, was literally ground to pieces by westbound passenger train No. 1 at Ulster about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Mr. Prince, who was an inspector of Hall signals, was at Ulster Saturday and while there he left his work for a few minutes to call upon his daughter who resides at that place. When he returned to the railroad crossing the east-bound Black Diamond was passing. As soon as the train went by he stepped on to the tracks directly in front of train No. 1. His body was crushed almost beyond recognition. Death was instantaneous.

The deceased was 63 years old and was born in Orwell township. He had been employed by the Lehigh for the past 35 years. He was a highly respected citizen and numbered as his friends all who were acquainted with him. He is survived by his wife and the following sons and daughters: Fred R. Prince, county commissioners' clerk; Hartley L. Prince, Mrs. B. S. Harden, Miss Helen Prince and Ronald Prince of Towanda, George Prince of Sayre and Mrs. Charles Horton of Ulster.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at 3 o'clock from the family home on Packer avenue, Towanda.

COUNCIL REVISES BORO SEWER PROJECT

Miltown, East Side and Northern Part of Sayre Will Be Added to the Plans

The borough council held a special meeting on Saturday evening to listen to a report of the sewer committee. A committee, composed of Messrs. Heverly, West and Walker, recently went to Harrisburg to confer with the State Department of Health, and to submit plans which have already been drawn for sewers for the borough. The department recommended that Miltown, the east side and the northern part of the borough be included in the plans, and the committee so reported to the council at the meeting on Saturday evening. There was a long discussion of the matter, during which one councilman offered to waver that the sewer project would be defeated when presented to the people.

A resolution was finally passed instructing N. F. Walker, the borough engineer, to survey the districts mentioned and make them a part of the plans already prepared. Mr. Walker will commence the work at once and when the plans are completed they will be sent to the department at Harrisburg for approval.

SAYRE CHURCHES RESPOND NOBLY

The Collections Taken Yesterday Were for the San Francisco Sufferers.

All the churches in Sayre took up collections yesterday for the San Francisco sufferers and the members of the various congregations responded liberally. The work of collecting for the fund will be brought to a system from this on, M. H. Sawtelle, cashier of the National Bank of Sayre, having consented to take charge of such funds and forward them to the proper authorities at San Francisco. This morning Mr. Sawtelle received the following telegram from Joseph A. Steinmetz, secretary of the Pennsylvania branch of the Red Cross at Philadelphia: "Will your bank receive subscriptions for the San Francisco relief on behalf of the Red Cross, transmitting the same to Mrs. A. J. Cassatt, treasurer, Philadelphia." Mr. Sawtelle immediately wired that he would comply with the request.

DIED AT OWEGO

Frederick E. Platt, aged 89 years, only brother of Senator Thomas E. Platt, died at his home in Owego last night after a brief illness of pneumonia. He was cashier of the Tioga National bank and was a most highly respected citizen.

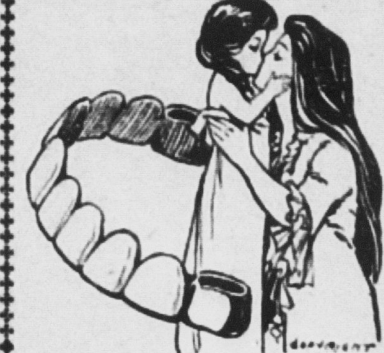
