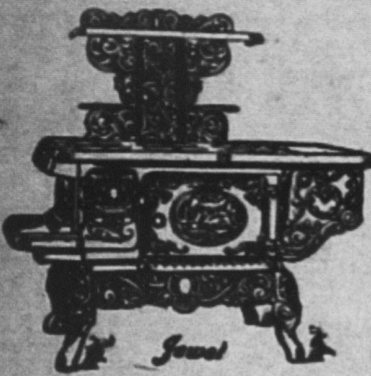

BUSINESS MEN'S FIRST ANNUAL

Banquet Held Last Night Is a Thoroughly Successful and Most Enjoyable Affair

The first annual banquet of the Sayre Business Men's Association, which is a few weeks less than a year old, was held last night in John R. Casper's handsome and well appointed dining hall at No. 226 Desmond street, and it can be unhesitatingly and truthfully asserted that few, if any, of the similar events given in this place in recent years, will equal it in the outburst of good fellowship and perfect harmony which prevailed throughout the entire evening.

There was not a single hitch. All the details had been carefully attended to by the various committees, and when the organization and their invited guests sat down to the excellent spread furnished by Caterer Casper there was not a single thing missing which would in any way mar the pleasure of the event.

Twenty-seven guests had been invited and nearly all were present, including President Lawrence of the village of Waverly, Secretary Decker of the Athens Business Men's Association, Hon. L. T. Hoyt member of the assembly from this county, Dr. Charles H. Ott of the Packer hospital, Jos. W. Beaman, Esq., of Athens, and other representative business and professional men of the three valley towns. Covers had been laid for 90 and nearly every place at the tables was occupied. A collation prepared under the direction of John R. Casper, Sayre's well known restaurateur, was served with neatness and despatch, while the inspiring strains of McGuffie's string orchestra added greatly to the enjoyment of the diners. Every business interest in the banner town of the valley was represented, and when the guests and members of the organization departed for their homes there was a unanimous sentiment that the four or more hours which had been spent in feasting and speech making were hours well spent and that the results therefrom will be of inestimable benefit to not only those who were present but to the citizens of Sayre generally.

Those who responded to toasts cannot be complimented too highly. The toast list contained seven numbers, and while it would take too much space to give even a short synopsis of the address of each speaker, it is an admitted fact that each subject was most appropriate to the occasion and was handled in every instance in an intelligent and forceful manner. The immediate needs of the borough were brought to the attention of those present by logic traveling hand in hand with eloquence, while excellent suggestions for the advancement of the association were received with much enthusiasm.

Dr. C. J. Cummings occupied the toastmaster's chair and acquitted himself in a most creditable manner, his introduction of the various speakers being punctuated with many sallies of wit, which at times brought down the house. Those who responded to toasts are as follows: "Organization, the Watchword of the Times and Age," C. C. West; "Organization and Association," M. H. Sawtelle; "The Benefits of Organization," D. Clary; "Municipal Improvements," I. A. Samuels; "Opposition and Competition," T. J. Leahey; "Cash Versus Credit," A. P. Wieland; "The Retail Merchant," Fred E. Seager; "Equal Taxation," Wm. M. Cross.

After the regular toast list had been concluded several were called upon who made ringing speeches of an impromptu nature which were well received and highly appreciated.

The banquet was a success from start to finish and reflects much credit upon those who had it in charge. The business men of Sayre have every reason to feel proud of their organization, and the citizens of Sayre should feel complimented that it has the organization.

SEWER PROJECT THE IMPORTANT QUESTION

Banquet Speakers Were United in Supporting Plans for a Sewer for the Borough

Among the speakers at the banquet last night who touched upon the subject at all it was the consensus of opinion that the sewer project is the most important question which confronts the citizens of Sayre at the present time. The question was referred to by several of the principal speakers and in each instance the Business Men's Association was urged to give the project its undivided support. The suggestion was made that the association should appoint a committee to wait on the borough council in an advisory capacity, and urge such legislation as is deemed indispensable to this municipality. Rev. J. L. Shanley, of the Church of the Epiphany, in a brief address touched the keynote of the question when he said that timidity should give way to boldness and that public improvements should be installed in the borough and the town bonded in such a manner that posterity would be compelled to pay at least a part of the cost. The suggestion is an excellent one for the council to give its attention. A little more of that quality which makes the successful speculator on the part of those in authority would give to this borough many things which at the present time it is doing without.

CHARLES FRANCIS LAMBERT DEAD

Highly Respected Young Man Expires This Morning of Consumption

The death of Charles Francis Lambert, one of Sayre's best known and highly respected young men, occurred at the home of his mother, Mrs. Hannah Lambert, No. 108 North Wilbur avenue, this morning at 6:50 o'clock, and exactly one week after the death of his sister, Mrs. John J. Holleran. As in the case of his sister, consumption was the cause of death.

Charles Francis Lambert had been a lifelong resident of Sayre, having been born here on October 10, 1883. Last fall he completed his time as a machinist's apprentice and shortly after took a trip through Arizona, Mexico and Colorado in search of health. He returned home on April 4, and has since failed rapidly. He was a young man of excellent habits and his death will cause keen regret among his many friends.

He is survived by his mother and two brothers, Robert and Bernard, all of this place. The funeral will be held from the Church of the Epiphany on Friday morning at 9 o'clock, the Rev. J. L. Shanley officiating. Burial in Catholic cemetery.

BALL GAME FUND FOR FIRE SUFFERERS

Game Will be Played on Friday Afternoon and the Proceeds Will be Sent to San Francisco

Yesterday afternoon plans were formulated for a ball game to be played on the Riverside diamond on Friday afternoon between the lawyers and druggists and the doctors and dentists, and the proceeds of the game are to go to the San Francisco fire sufferers. The game will be the event of the season. No one will deny this when the line-up of those who are to take part is published. The proposed game was brought up at the Business Men's banquet last night and today Burgess Cross will be asked to issue a proclamation requesting the business men to close their stores while the contest is in progress. By so doing a large crowd will be assured and a goodly sum will thus be turned over to the proper authorities and sent to San Francisco.

The game itself will be governed by rules especially adopted for the purpose. Nine innings will be played, provided it don't end in a fight and the spectators will stand it that long. Any player who is caught with the ball in his hands will be sent to the borough "bug house" for the term of his natural life. A player who is caught moving about the field faster than a walk will be transported to Ulster or Milan, as the crowd may elect, and only allowed to return upon signing an affidavit that he will never be caught doing it again.

Any player who helps another player from the field will be credited with an assist and entitled to recover punitive damages. Broken legs, fingers, arms, and bruises, strains, wrenches, etc., will be treated free of charge by the corps of able physicians who will be on the ground. Nurses will be charged for extra.

Applause from the grand stand will not be tolerated as the majority of the players are a timid lot and won't stand for it. Persons emitting cat calls and other uncomplimentary noises will be socially ostracised and ejected from the grounds. These will probably be the only "put outs" during the game.

The umpire will be protected by armor plate and carefully guarded by a cordon of police who have been instructed to shoot any player or other person who becomes demonstrative. The game will be called to order as near to 3 o'clock as possible.

Dr. Williams, D. D. S., will be allowed ten minutes to go from the home plate to first base. Bottle holders and men with sponges will be stationed at the latter point to give him such aid as is necessary.

Doctors who line up for the game with their medicine chests in their hands will be charged one dollar for violating the ethics of the profession.

Dentists who attempt to distribute circulars advertising cut rates on fillings and plate work will be executed without delay.

A lawyer who shows any disposition to play an honest game will be looked upon with suspicion and his credentials as a member of the profession will be carefully scrutinized.

Druggists will be required to show certificates of character before they are allowed admission to the grounds. This rule will be strictly enforced as the exigencies of the case demand it.

The names of the heroes who will participate in the battle will be published tomorrow.
