THE OLYMPIC GAMES.

Ray C. Ewry, New York Athletic Club, won standing long jump.

ATHENS, April 27.—Ray C. Ewry of the New York Athletic club won the standing long jump at the Olympic games here.

Gouder of France won the pole jump. Lieutenant Hawtry of England won the five mile run.

The final of the swimming and diving contests of the Olympic games were postponed owing to the weather.

When the competitors reached Philadelphia they found that a full gale was blowing and the sea was so rough that it was determined to postpone the finals.

In the final of the French team beat the English by 9 to 6 points.

The weight lifting contest produced a sensational incident. Champion Tofalos' most formidable competitor was an Austrian giant of the name of Steinbach.

When Steinbach appeared the audience hooted him down, and after vainly protesting against the disturbance Steinbach retired from the contest.

The most interesting event of the day was the javelin throwing, in which the Swedes distanced all competitors.

Tofalos, Greek, won the weight lifting contest, his mark being 144.40 kilograms.

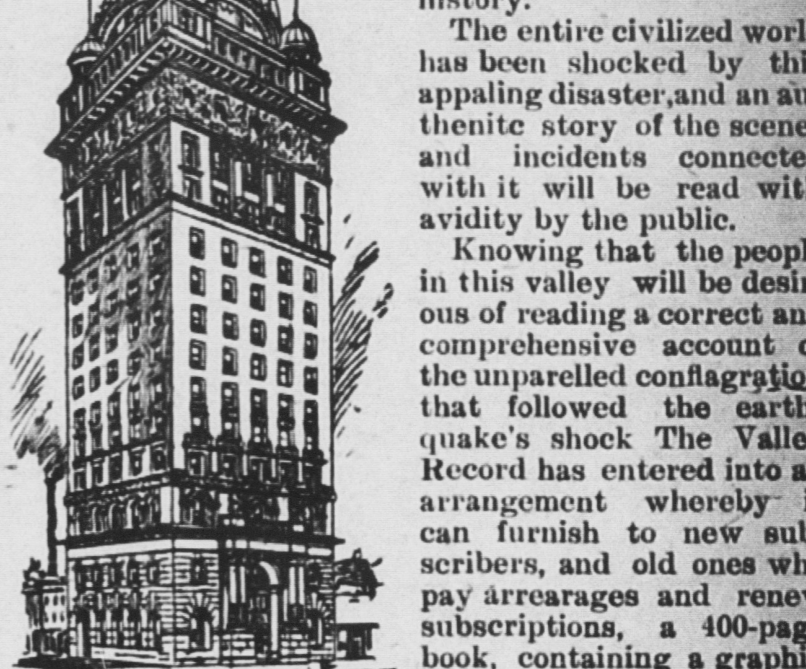
