R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Business.

NEW YORK, May 5.-R, G. Dun Co.'s weekly review of trade says: The violent decline in prices of secu rities is no criterion of business conditions. Stocks fell about 10 per cent from the highest point attained earlier in the year to the lowest position since last June, but there was no corresponding depression in trade. Railway earn ings have continued to surpass those of the corresponding period in any pre vious year, the gain for April being 9.3 rom Binghamton for over Sunday. per cent over the same month of 1905, and other standards of measurements
