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BICYCLE RIDER IS SERIOUSLY INJURED
Athens—John L. DeGroff, Irwin Stroud and Lewis Briner rode down to Milan yesterday on their bicycles to see Clyde Anthony, who is sick. On their return, when in front of the Murray farm house Mr. DeGroff's wheel ran into a ditch and threw him heavily to the ground, breaking his thigh. Eugene Allen was driving by and took the injured man home in his wagon, arriving in Athens at 4:20 p. m. Dr. C. L. Stevens, assisted by Drs. Holcomb and Ott, reduced the fracture and the patient is resting comfortably. It was a bad break at the thigh, as he had been riding at a rapid rate when the accident occurred. Mr. DeGroff will be confined to his home for a long time. He preferred to be cared for at his home, where his injuries were attended to.

NEW BATTLESHIP ASHORE.
Rhode Island Fast on Rocks in Chesapeake Bay.
PORTSMOUTH, Va., May 7.—The battleship Rhode Island is ashore on York shoal, in Chesapeake bay.

While proceeding from Boston for Yorktown for target practice the big ship went aground, and the last heard of her was to the effect that she was hard and fast.

The warship in attempting to enter York river before daybreak got out of the channel, it is said, by the pilot losing his bearings in misty weather.

While the big ship is in no immediate danger, there is some uneasiness felt for her safety should a sudden severe blow come on.

Members of the Virginia Pilots' association say the ship is in a serious condition.

Her plight was made known to this navy yard by wireless telegraph as soon as her commanding officer, Captain Harrington, realized that she could not be worked off the sandbar with her own engines.

For fear of injuring the splendid vessel he decided to await the arrival of assistance. The naval tugs Hercules, Uncas and Mohawk were at once rushed from the navy yard. These powerful vessels will pull on the grounded warship at high tide, and it is believed that she will be floated without injury.

The Rhode Island was on her way from Boston to Yorktown to test her great guns.

The Rhode Island went ashore at nearly high water, drawing about twenty-four feet.

In view of the presence on the scene of four powerful tugs and the fact that the scene of the grounding is inside of the bay and in smooth water, naval officials feel that the Rhode Island will get off without harm, though it may be necessary to lighten her by taking off some coal and heavy stores.

A court of inquiry will be appointed to ascertain the cause of the accident and report whether further action should be taken against any one who may be responsible.

Nigeria Has President's O. K.
WASHINGTON, May 7.—President Roosevelt had a two hours' conference over New York state politics with Governor Higgins, after which Governor Higgins announced that the president would take no part whatever in the selection of a state committee chairmanship. Beyond this the governor was inclined to be noncommittal and either refused to answer queries or evaded them by changing the subject to the weather. It is understood that the governor came to Washington to discuss the subject of certain federal appointments in the Empire State and, according to his intimations, left the White House with the presidential O. K. in his pocket.

Pastor Accused of Firing His Church.
WATERLOO, N. Y., May 7.—Rev. C. Stuart Bain, pastor of the First Baptist church of Waterloo, was arrested here on a charge of arson in the third degree. Mr. Bain was committed to jail. His church here was burned March 8 last. The pastor's arrest followed a long examination, during which he is alleged to have received concerning the church and which the prosecution claims he wrote himself. Mr. Bain denied having set fire to the church. He came here last October from Newburg, and no notice can be assigned for his alleged acts.

Engineer Blamed for Ten Deaths.
ALTOONA, Pa., May 7.—The official report of the collision between the east-bound Chicago mail train and the west-bound Chicago and St. Louis express on the Petersburg cutoff of the Pennsylvania road, which caused the death of ten persons and the injury of many others, lays the blame on Engineer J. T. Dougherty, who was hauling the express train.

Accident to Steamer Friesland.
NEWPORT, R. I., May 7.—The Fall River line steamer Friesland, which became disabled through an accident in Narragansett bay, has arrived in Newport in tow of the freighter City of Taunton, from Fall River. Most of the passengers remained on board the Friesland through the night and were removed by the steamer Puritan of the same line.

His Love Impelled Wife's Murder.
LONG BRANCH, N. J., May 7.—Thaddeus Burch, who came here from Virginia in search of his wife, who left him some time ago, met the woman on the street last night and after a few words shot her dead. He was arrested and declared his love for his wife impelled the deed.
