**ATHENS BOROUGH
COUNCIL MEETING**

Athens—The regular meeting of the borough council was held last evening, all the members except Keefe being present. M. W. Nevin of the finance committee presented the budget of expenses for the present year, which would amount in the aggregate to about \$1,900. It was decided to levy a tax for regular borough expenses of 7 1/2 mills, for improvements 2 mills, and for the 1894 bonds one half mill, making 10 mills in all. As it is found that the aggregate expenses would be in excess of resources it was decided that there should be no work done by the street commissioner this year except such as may be approved and ordered by the committee on streets.

A request having been made by the members of No. 4 hose company that they be provided with a hose house in which to keep their apparatus, quite a discussion arose as to what should be done. The borough attorney stated that the lot in litigation between Mr. West and the borough was in an unsettled state and that no decision could be reached as to its ownership; that if the hose house was built at present it would be necessary to find some other location. There are two lots that could be purchased for the lot north of and adjoining the Stevens grocery on North Main street for \$600, on which there is an indebtedness of \$25, and that plans, specifications and bids for the hose house be advertised for at once.

The question of the proposed improved street from the northern terminus of the Main street pavement to the Sayre borough line was next taken up. Mr. Mills stated that he had a communication with State Highway Commissioner Hunter and he has placed the cost of the improvement at from \$800 to \$1,000. It was unanimously decided to ask the state authorities for the proposed improvement.

Mr. Clark presented the matter of the catch basins and sewers on the Spruce street locality and gave some idea as to what should be done in order to relieve the situation. After passing upon the bills presented the council adjourned.

Political Announcement

To the Republican Voters of Bradford County:

In formally announcing my candidacy for re-election to the office of Representative in the legislature from Bradford county, I recognize the right of my constituents to know my attitude, both past and future, on those questions which are of such vital importance to the country at large.

I therefore desire to state, that if re-elected, I shall favor the following legislation, and will introduce and work for the enactment of these subjects, viz:

The amendment to the Constitution whereby the basis of the representation in the law-making body shall be citizenship and not an indiscriminate population of foreigners centered in the large cities to the prejudice and exclusion of the agricultural districts.

The revision of the tax laws so that all kinds of property and franchises shall pay the same millage on the dollar of valuation.

The limiting of all franchises to a reasonable length of time.

The granting to trolley roads of all privileges enjoyed by steam railroads, including the right of eminent domain and the right to carry freight.

The retention of all license fees and personal property tax by the county.

The increase of the state aid in the township road law from 15 to 50%.

The granting to the people at large more power to decide some of the more important questions, such as the granting of franchises, municipal ownership of public service corporations and matters of a local character.

The repeal of the iniquitous sheriff's fee bill.

The final disposition of petty misdemeanors before a justice of the peace and a jury of six, whereby a large portion of the expense of maintaining the criminal courts will be eliminated.

The enactment of legislation providing for equality of rates charged by transportation companies, both freight and passenger, and a maximum passenger rate of two cents per mile.

Increased appropriation to public schools, especially township high schools, even to the extent of the state bearing the entire expense of maintaining the public school system.

The enactment of the Anti-Trust bill introduced by me at the last regular session, prohibiting the combination of capital for the purpose of controlling the prices of commodities by monopolies.

The repeal of the present muzzler law by the enactment of a just and equitable libel law.

I respectfully solicit the support of all voters who are in favor of the enactment of this legislation and pledge myself, if re-elected, to use every effort on my part to secure the enactment of the same.

**MUST STAY ON
THE DRIVEWAYS**

Athens—Our Grand Army comrades have been disturbed by reports that have come to them that the authorities of Tioga Point cemetery have decided that we would not be admitted to the grounds on Memorial day. Major Gore, chairman of the committee, has had a conversation with the sexton in regard to this matter, and finds that the authorities had found fault with the manner in which horses and carriages had been driven over the burial lots and have determined that some means shall be taken to prevent it. There has been no action taken, but it is believed that extra precaution will be taken to keep horses and carriages on the driveways. The soldier comrades enter into this service with a spirit of true reverence, and they are anxious that there shall be no desecration of the sacred resting place of the dead.

FENCE COMPLETED

Athens—The erection of the iron fence around Tioga Point cemetery has been completed and it is a very great improvement in the appearance of that place. There are three gates, one at the main street entrance, another on the north side and the third at the rear on Pennsylvania avenue. There is a large gate at the main entrance for the driving with small gates each side for foot travelers. The other two gates have the main driveway and one side entrance for footmen.

S. R. Payne received a telegram this morning informing him that the wife of Dr. E. D. Payne, his brother, died very suddenly at 3 o'clock this morning at Atlantic City. Mr. Payne went to Towanda on the noon train today and will remain there until the arrival of the remains, which are expected tomorrow afternoon. There are no particulars as to the cause of her death.
