NEW YORK, May 12.—Carl Schurz, former secretary of the interior, has had a turn for the worse, and it was feared that he is dying.

His son, Carl L. Schurz, last night telephoned Dr. A. Jacobl, asking him to hurry to the patient, as his pulse had become very weak.

A letter from the late Carnegie had called at the Schurz residence and was allowed to see the patient.

The physician has given it out that there is no hope of Mr. Schurz's recovery.

In the half century he has lived in America Mr. Schurz has been active in many directions in politics, having been successively a Republican, Democrat and Independent. He was one of the founders of the Civil Service Reform association, of which he was elected president a week ago.

He was very active mentally until the day he was stricken with this trouble. He still took a lively interest in the politics and affairs of the day. During the last majority campaign he endorsed William M. Ivis.

Increased appropriation to public schools, especially township high schools, so even to the extent of the state bearing the entire expense of maintaining the public school system.

The enactment of the Anti-Trust bill introduced by me at the last regular session, prohibiting the combination of capital for the purpose of controlling the prices of commodities by monopolism.

The repeal of the present muzzler law by the enactment of a just and equitable libel law.

I respectfully solicit the support of all voters who are in favor of the enactment of this legislation and pledge myself, if re-elected, to use every effort on my part to secure the enactment of the same.
