**CARL SCHURZ DYING.**

Dr. Jacoby States That There Is No Hope of Recovery.

NEW YORK, May 12.—Carl Schurz, former secretary of the interior, has had a turn for the worse, and it was feared that he is dying.

His son, Carl L. Schurz, last night telephoned for Dr. A. Jacoby, asking him to hurry to the patient, as his pulse had become very weak.

A friend of Andrew Carnegie had called at the Schurz residence and was allowed to see the patient.

The physician has given it out that there is no hope of Mr. Schurz's recovery.

He is seventy-seven years old and is suffering from a stomach disorder, complicated with other diseases.

In the half century he has lived in America Mr. Schurz has been active in many directions in politics, having been successively a Republican, Democrat and independent. He was one of the founders of the Civil Service Reform association, of which he was elected president a week ago.

He was very active mentally until the day he was stricken with this trouble. He still took a lively interest in the politics and affairs of the day.

During the last mayoralty campaign he endorsed William M. Ivins.

Last November Mr. Schurz fell from a trolley car at Forty-second street and Madison avenue, but it was not thought at the time he was failing in health.

**Awards For Palace of Peace Design.**

THE HAGUE, May 12.—Awards in the competition for designs for the Palace of Peace have been made. The first prize, \$3,000, was awarded to L. M. Cordonnier of Lille, France; the second, \$2,250, to A. Marcel of Paris; the third, \$1,750, to Otto Wagner of Vienna. A prize of \$750 was awarded to Messrs. Howard Greenley and H. S. Olin of New York. The winning design is a splendidly executed conception in the style of a northern French chateau.
