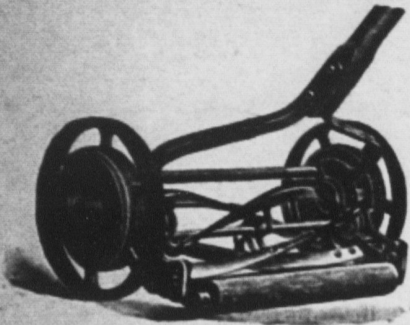

## LIFE-LONG SAYRE RESIDENT DEAD

James Merrill Died at His Home Last Night After Brief Illness

James Merrill, a life-long resident of Bradford county, and since 1865 a highly respected resident of this place, died at his home last night of a complication of troubles arising from several slight shocks of paralysis which he had sustained recently. Mr. Merrill resided on Keystone avenue and his death removes one of the oldest and best known citizens of Sayre. He had not been confined to his home long, but within the last week had failed rapidly.

The deceased was born in Litchfield, February 16, 1828, and was therefore 78 years, 2 months and 25 days old. He moved to the house in which he died on Keystone avenue in 1865 and had since continued to reside there. Mr. Merrill married twice. His first wife was Miss Hannah Hartshorn, to whom he was united in 1852. On May 22, 1884, she died. Two years later he was married to Mrs. Maria Kenyon by whom he is survived. One son, Edgar J. Merrill, of Sayre, and a brother, Eli N. Merrill of Athens, also survive.

The funeral will be held from the late home of the deceased on Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

## OLD OFFENDERS IN POLICE COURT

Tom and Mike McAsse, Cousins, Engage in a Brawl Last Night and Land in Jail

Tom McAsse of Ridgedary and Michael of Athens, cousins, were inmates of the borough bastle last night and this morning were arraigned on charges of drunkenness and disorderly conduct. Both men were arrested by Officer William Corner. Tom had been across the tracks and engaged in a fight with a bartender, and when asked this morning if he had been fighting stated that the other fellow must have been doing most of the work. Tom's face was badly battered and he looked as if he had been given severe treatment. He admitted having paid over forty dollars in fines into the village treasury at Waverly, but that recently he had chosen a jail sentence rather than to pay a fine. He said, however, that he had no recollection of having heretofore been arrested in Sayre. He was fined \$1.00 and costs.

Tom's cousin, Mike, was then arraigned and admitted having been drunk, so much so in fact that it was necessary for the officer to carry him to the lockup. He also was fined the usual amount, and left his watch and chain as security for both fines.

## EVIDENCE ALL IN FOR COMMONWEALTH

Defense in Johnson Murder Case Began Presenting Testimony Today

This forenoon the commonwealth in the Charles Johnson murder case finished presenting its evidence and the taking of testimony for the defense began. It is expected that the greater part of next week will be consumed in hearing the evidence of the defense and the summing. The fact that the trial could not possibly be finished this week has made it necessary to postpone the cases that were to come up during the second week of court. Accordingly Judge Fanning yesterday issued an order instructing the jurors for the second week of court that their presence will not be required until Thursday, May 17, and it is quite likely that they will then again be excused until the following week. The attendance at the trial is small. Yesterday morning there were only 11 persons outside the rail. Later in the day a half dozen women came in, but at no time has the crowd been large. The testimony thus far produced is nothing new, and this accounts, in a large measure, for the lack of interest on the part of the public.

## PARK MANAGEMENT GRANTED A LICENSE

Messrs. Salisbury & Murray Will Pay \$1.00 per night for the Privilege of Operating Popular Resort this Season

This morning Messrs. Salisbury & Murray were granted a license to operate Oak Grove Park during the coming season. The license was granted by Burgess William Cross and provides that the management of the park shall pay into the borough treasury the sum of \$1.00 per night, the same as last year. This will settle a question which is said to have "agitated the minds of some to a considerable extent." The season this year will last fifteen weeks, which means that the borough will receive the lump sum of \$15.00 for the season, \$65 more than is paid by the management of the Loomis for a season of nine months, and more than ten times the amount received by Sayre borough for licenses from other sources. The park has never been a big money making proposition, and many times has barely paid. The money taken in at the park for the most part finds its way back into the pockets of the residents of this valley, and as it is the only place of amusement in the valley during the summer time, the management is to be congratulated that the price for the license has not been made prohibitive.

## SECURED OPTION

The Lehigh Valley Railroad Company has for some time past been negotiating for the purchase of the tract of land upon which is located the famous Pocono Cliff, one of the most beautiful spots in the State, from which can be enjoyed extensive views of mountains, valley and river, all of surpassing grandeur. The tract consists of about 400 acres. It is all, or nearly all, within the limits of the borough of East Mauch Chunk, and extends over the mountain down to Long Run. The Lehigh has already secured an option on the property and a complete survey is now being made.

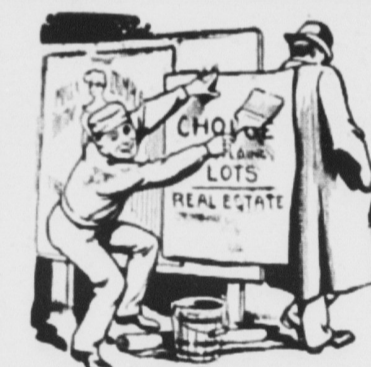

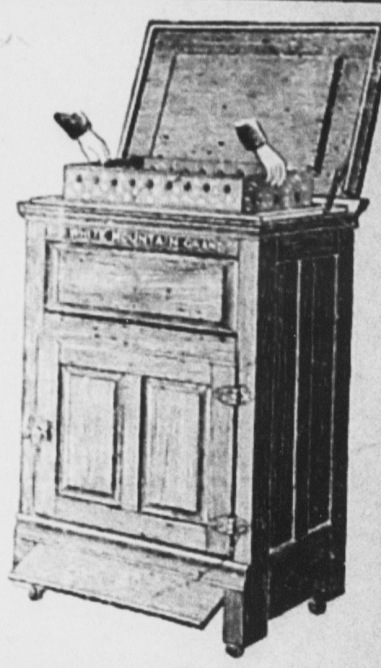
