CONRAD SNYDER

Athens—We yesterday published a notice of the death of Conrad Snyder. We obtained the story from his brother, John Snyder, who had just drove up with a spirited horse which he was not able to hold, and published it as he gave it. This morning Nathan Snyder, father of the deceased, showed us a letter from George Snyder's wife which was written Monday, May 7, containing the information that Conrad was sent to the hospital that day and was suffering a severe attack of appendicitis, and that the doctor said an operation must be performed in the morning to save his life. Nothing further was heard from him until yesterday morning, when a telegram was received stating that he was in a dangerous condition, and in about two hours another dispatch was received with the news that he was dead. His remains will be taken to Wilkes-Barre today and from there to Butler Valley, Pa., for interment. Nathan Snyder went to Wilkes-Barre today noon to attend the funeral.
