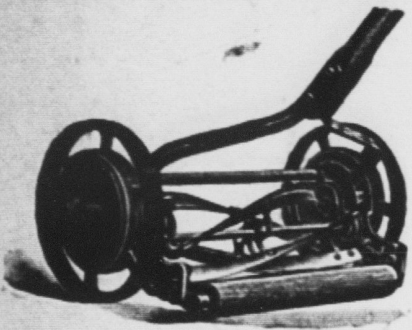

## WILL GO TO JURY THIS AFTERNOON

Johnson Murder Case Rapidly Nearing the End

The Johnson murder case will probably go to the jury this afternoon and a verdict may be reached tonight. District Attorney Mills occupied nearly all the forenoon in making the closing address to the jury and this afternoon Judge Fanning charged the jury and explained the law to them.

Yesterday the jury listened to the addresses of counsel for the prisoner. Mr. Maxwell made the opening plea for the Commonwealth and was followed by Attorney Wilson of the defense. The arguments of both gentlemen were listened to by a large crowd of spectators.

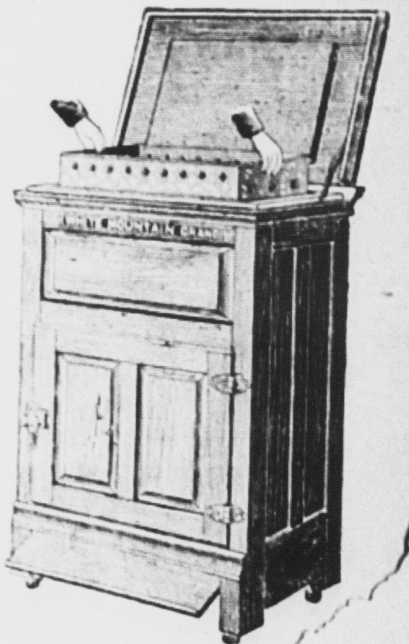
