Roosevelt Charged With Insincerity by Tillman.

CODE OF HONOR SHOULD BIND ALL MEN

Says Executive Asked Chandler to See Mr. Balley and Himself Regarding Rate Bill-Was Guilty of Had Faith,

WASHINGTON, May 16. - Senator Fillman renewed his attacks on the president in the senate when the session opened. He said be had waited for the president's friends to produce but they had not done so. He read president's request.
