VILLAGE TRUSTEE TURNS OFFICER

Arrests Street Fakir and Thereby Creates a Rumpus at Waverly Last Night

Waverly—All Waverly was busy today talking about the arrest of a street vender named M. Harris by W. C. Farley, a village trustee, last night.

It is stated by several persons who were present that business was brisk when several boys began to make disconcerting noises, and that Harris remonstrated with them, whereupon Mr. Farley encouraged the boys to continue the disturbance. This led to a rather spirited exchange of remarks between Harris and Farley, in which the vender got somewhat the better of it.

Mr. Farley then went to the town hall and demanded of Chief Brooks that he arrest the vender, but he did not make a charge that seemed lawful to the chief and he refused, but Officer Gridley accompanied Mr. Farley to where the selling was taking place, and Farley directed the officer to make the arrest. Officer Gridley refused, and Mr. Farley then announced that he himself would make the arrest. He accordingly pressed forward and seizing Harris by the collar drew him from the wagon and took him to the town hall.

A crowd of 200 or more followed and created a great disturbance over the arrest, the sympathy of the great majority being with Harris.

The town hall was jammed to the doors, and there were those in the crowd who expressed a desire to do violence to the trustee, but saner counsel prevailed.

Mr. Farley made out a John Doe complaint, charging Harris with conducting a lottery, and the accused was allowed to go on his own recognizance until 3 p. m. tomorrow, when he will be given a hearing.

STREET WIDENED UNDER PROTEST

Parties Claim That the Village Has Trespasped on Their Property

Waverly—Yesterday morning Street Commissioner Bingham started work on East Chemung street, but was stopped by Attorney F. E. Hawkes, who claimed that he was trespassing on the property of Mrs. Combs and Mrs. Suter, as the work of cutting the street took in most of the front yards of his clients. President Lawrence and Trustee Farley directed the work to continue, and Mr. Hawkes went to Owego, it was supposed to get an injunction. The work continued, however, and by one o'clock it was completed. Mr. Hawkes returned but did not serve an injunction. He stated, however, that if the village had encroached on the land that he would sue in trespass all who engaged in the work.

FOUR BURGLARIES WERE COMMITTED

Four Business Places Entered Last Night and Robbed of Small Amounts of Money and Merchandise

Waverly—Howard Ferris of Sayre and a young fellow named McHale of this village, are in the lockup charged with burglarizing four business places. This morning just before daylight Officers Gridley and Corcoran observed the accused parties on Broad street and followed them around in the alley in the rear of the stores. Ferris was easily captured, but it took a foot race on the part of Gridley before McHale was taken in charge. When searched they had some money and a large number of pipes, and a quantity of tobacco and playing cards on them. Investigation showed the stores of H. L. Nichols, J. P. Murphy, Gateley furniture store and Ballenstedts bakery, had been broken into, while an attempt had been made on McGlenn's clothing store. Both the prisoners are hard characters and have served time in jail.

John Caverly and James Caferty went to Rochester yesterday and from there they will go to Geneva.

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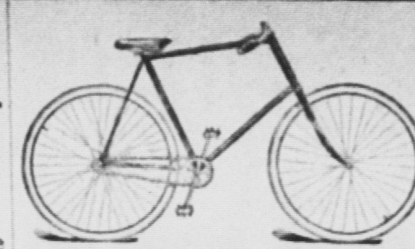
PURCHASED BARBER SHOP
