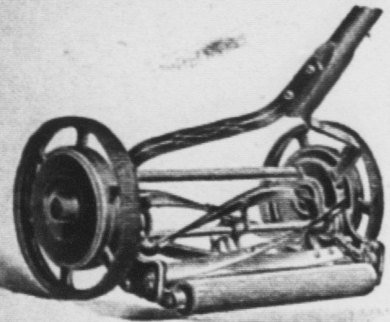

GUILTY OF MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE

Charles Johnson Convicted a Second Time for the Killing of Mrs. Maggie Johnson and Annie Benjamin

At 4:50 o'clock yesterday afternoon the jury in the Charles Johnson murder case returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. Judge Fanning deferred sentence for four days in order to give the condemned man's attorneys an opportunity to prepare points on which to move for a new trial.

The case against Johnson was given to the jury just after 4 o'clock and less than a half hour was spent in deliberating the matter. A ballot was taken to determine the guilt or innocence of the prisoner, and every member of the jury voted "guilty." A ballot was then taken to fix the degree of guilt, and all but one member of the jury voted "murder in the first degree." A second ballot was immediately taken and the vote for a first degree verdict was made unanimous.

The jury returned to the court room and exactly at 5:30 o'clock the verdict was announced. Johnson stood up when the words which mean that he is to swing were pronounced. His face did not change color and from all outward appearance he was in no way disturbed by the verdict.

The verdict of the twelve men sitting as jurors will meet with general approval. It was proved beyond a peradventure that Charles had a hand in the actual killing on that fateful night of September 18, 1904, the story of which is so well known to newspapers of Bradford county, and unless his attorneys can induce the board of pardons to interfere, the sentence of the court which will be pronounced on Saturday next will in all probability be executed. The disposition of the case of Charles Johnson will close the final chapter of the most heinous crime that was ever perpetrated in Bradford county, and the law abiding citizens of this section will breathe a sigh of relief when it is all over. The county has been burdened with thousands of dollars of expense, the regular business of the court of common pleas has been retarded, and those who have been connected with the case as witnesses, jurors, officers, etc., have been put to no end of trouble. It is hoped, however, that the lesson taught will result in its being many years before the courts of this county are called upon to dispose of a similar case.

FAVOR REPEAL OF LIBEL LAW

Legislative Candidates in This County Say They Are Opposed to the "Press Muzzler"

At the session of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Press Association which was held in Sayre two weeks ago, a resolution was passed to address a letter to all the legislative candidates asking them to define their position on the "Press Muzzler" libel law. The newspapers are determined to secure the enactment of a new libel law at the next session of the legislature, and in some cases the newspapers of the state are absolutely refusing to support the candidates who will not pledge themselves as against the "muzzler." In this county Giles M. Coons, Hon. L. T. Hoyt, W. D. Morse, George Moscrip, Dr. C. L. Stevens, and E. M. Tuton, all candidates for legislative honors, have written letters to E. B. McKee, chairman of the Press Association committee, and they express themselves as being in favor of a more equitable libel law. Senator R. S. Edminston, who holds office for the next legislative term, is also in favor of a more liberal law, which will please the majority of the responsible newspapers of the state. It is the intention of the Press committee to interview other candidates as soon as they are known.

APPENDICITIS CASE MISSED AMBULANCE

Fourteen-Year-Old Lad Was Able to Walk Despite Fact He Was Afflicted With the Disease

Yesterday afternoon the Packer hospital received notice to have the ambulance at the Lehigh station to meet train No. 127 which is due to arrive in Sayre at eight o'clock. The notice stated that a patient who resided in Wyalusing would be on the train. The ambulance went to the station, but after the train had pulled into the station and discharged its load of human freight the surgeon in charge failed to find anything like a person that had the appearance of needing hospital treatment. Accordingly the ambulance was driven back to the hospital. Shortly after its departure, however, the night ticket agent went to the platform, where he noticed a boy sitting on the steps that lead into the ladies' waiting room. The boy was about fourteen years of age, and he was crying as if his heart would break. The kindly heart of the ticket agent was touched, and he inquired of the lad as to the cause of his tears. Between his sobs the lad replied that he had appendicitis and had been sent from his home at Wyalusing to the hospital at this place. The ticket agent immediately notified the hospital and the ambulance was again sent to the station. The tears in the eyes of the lad disappeared, he walked to the ambulance and when he had seated himself inside he appeared happy and contented despite the fact that on the morrow he was to undergo an operation.

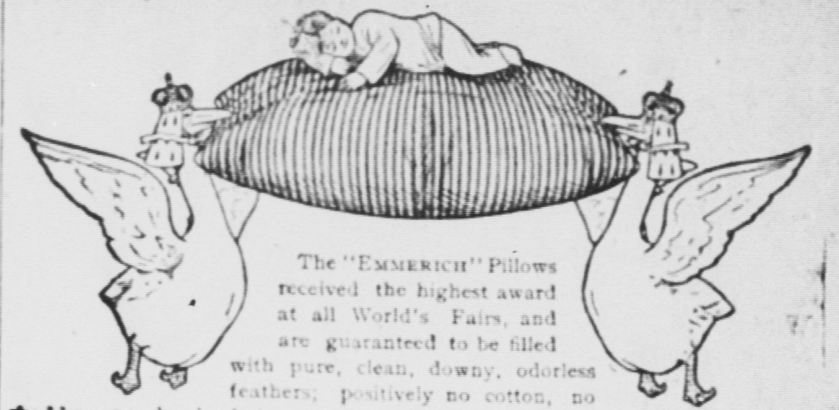

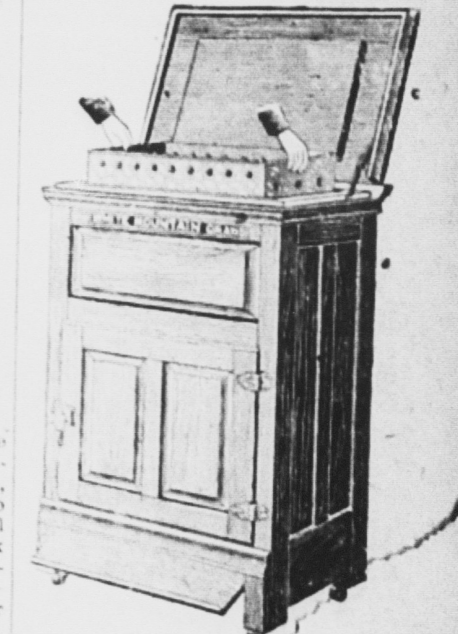
