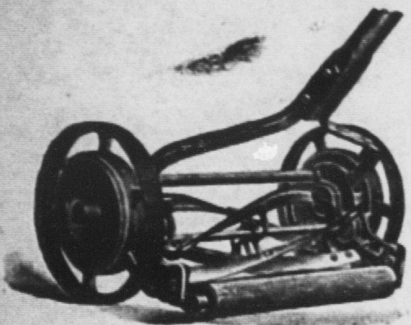

ENGINE SLIGHTLY DAMAGED BY FIRE

Early Morning Blaze Easily Extinguished by Shop Fire Department

A locomotive which had been standing in the Sayre yards during last night was somewhat damaged by fire this morning about 7:30 o'clock. The locomotive was on its way to a western road and was in charge of a man employed by the Baldwin Locomotive Works. This morning he was preparing his breakfast on a small oil stove in the cab of the engine. He had occasion to go to the cab of another engine of which he also had charge, and when he returned to see how his breakfast was coming on discovered that the stove had set fire to the interior of the cab. He ran for assistance and an alarm of fire was sent in. The shop fire department responded and when they arrived the flames had made considerable headway, but they were easily extinguished. The damage is not considered extensive and is covered by insurance.

STREET FAKIR CAME TO SAYRE

When Wanted at Waverly He Was Found Here But Officers Induced Him to go Back

M. Harris, the street fakir who was arrested in Waverly on Tuesday evening by Trustee Farley, and who was to have been given a hearing before Justice Hoagland yesterday afternoon, was missing when the time set for the hearing arrived. Mr. Harris had left the jurisdiction of the court and Chief of Police Brooks was sent out to find him. The man was located in Sayre, and after some persuasion on the part of the chief and the police authorities of this place he was induced to return to Waverly without the necessity of issuing a warrant for his arrest as a fugitive from justice.

W. C. T. U. INSTITUTE WELL ATTENDED

Three Sessions Were Held Today and Results Are Highly Satisfactory

The Women's Christian Temperance Union held an institute in the M. E. church in this place and had three sessions morning, afternoon and evening. The meeting was presided over by Mrs. Sylvia B. FATHER AND SON DEMAND DAMAGES

Lad Injured by a Lehigh Engine Joins With His Parent in Suit Against Company

The suit against the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, in which Ray Erway and his father, E. Erway, claim twenty thousand dollars damages is on trial at Hazleton. The plaintiffs have brought their suits jointly. The boy claims \$18,000 damages for having been struck by one of the defendant's trains, and the father desires to recover the sum of \$2,000 by reason of his son having been incapacitated. The accident to young Erway occurred in November, 1904. It is alleged that he was struck by an engine operated by the defendant company while he was driving over a grade crossing between Drifton and Freeland. As a result of the accident, the horses, which he was driving were killed, the wagon demolished, and the lad was seriously injured about the spine and body. The plaintiff also claims that the engine was being driven backwards without a headlight or other signal, and was going at such a rapid rate of speed that he did not have time to escape being hit.

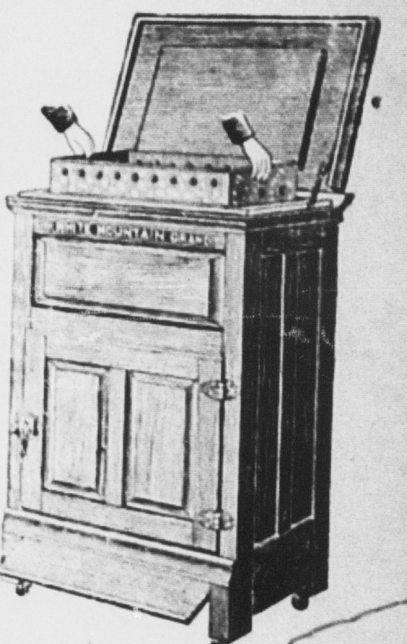
