India's Coasting Trade.  
For some unexplained reason the coasting trade of India does not keep pace with the foreign. The latest statistics issued by the department of commercial intelligence show that the value of the goods carried by sea from one Indian port to another has diminished since 1900. In that year it amounted to about \$150,000,000, the following year it fell off 11 per cent, and last year was still more than five per cent. under that of 1900.

New York's Expenses.  
The gross indebtedness of New York is greater than that of the Chinese empire. The cost of operating this city's government for one year almost equals the annual expenditures of both London and Paris combined. New York pays out in salaries alone the vast sum of \$65,000,000 yearly, or as much as London spends for its entire administration. At the present time there are 45,000 men and women on that city's pay roll.

### TRUSTEES AWARD PAVING CONTRACT

Provide for Sprinkling a Number of Streets, Turned Down the Lawrence Avenue Proposition, and Transact Other Business.

Waverly—The board of trustees held a regular adjourned meeting last evening.

The matter of the proposed street running from Ithaca to Chemung street, through the lands of Emma Lane and along the east line of the property of O. H. Lawrence was considered. Trustee Howard opposed the acquisition of the street on the ground that the benefits to be derived were not commensurate with the expense. He stated that the land would cost at least \$1,200.00, whether bought outright or condemned. President Lawrence spoke in favor of the street. The vote being taken the result was as follows: Lawrence, Farley and Myers, yes; Brown, Brougham and Howard, no. The vote being a tie the proposition was lost.

Miss Sliter and Mrs. Combs appeared before the board and stated that they desired some kind of a settlement for the damages to their property, growing out of the recent work on Chemung street. Miss Sliter placed her damages at \$150, but Mrs. Combs stated that she had not yet been able to determine the extent of her loss. President Lawrence stated that the board would consider the claim and give an answer in the near future.

Trustee Howard offered a resolution, which was passed, for the appointment of a committee to look over the village ordinances, revise the same and advise such new ordinances as they deemed necessary. have the ordinances engrossed in a book and printed in a pamphlet.

The change of the grade of sidewalks on Broad street was referred to the sidewalk committee.

A resolution was presented by Trustee Farley, and passed, providing for the sprinkling of Broad street from Spaulding to Chemung, and Pennsylvania and Park avenues and Loder and Tioga streets for their entire length, Waverly, Clark and Fulton streets up as far as Clinton avenue and Chemung street up to Ithaca street. Residents on all other streets who wish the streets sprinkled are asked to petition the board.

F. E. Hawkes, Esq., and a representative of the N. Y. & Pa. Telephone Company appeared and asked that a committee be appointed to confer with the company relative to the method by which that company's wires should be placed under ground. The committee was appointed.

The only bid received on the paving job was from J. T. Higgins. His bid was, excavating, 34 cents a yard, paving, \$2.14 a yard; headers, 50 cents; straight curb, 60 cents; and bending curb, 70 cents. The bid was accepted and the president directed to enter into a contract.

The request of the Spaulding hose company that their rooms be papered was referred to the building committee, with power to act.

Arc lights were ordered placed at the corner of Orchard street and Clinton avenue and on Pennsylvania avenue at the state line.

A resolution offered by Trustee Farley for the appointment of a commission to be known as the "Industrial Commission of the Village of Waverly," and to consist of seven members who would look out for the industrial welfare of the village, failed to pass.

O. L. Barton was appointed special policeman. President Lawrence reported that the pay of the janitor at the town hall had been fixed by agreement at \$37 per month. The board ratified the agreement.

### COURT DECIDED AGAINST VILLAGE

Judge Sewell States That Village Must Get Consent of State Water Commission

Waverly—Judge Sewell has handed down a decision sustaining the contention of the water company that the village of Waverly must first get the consent of the state water commission before it can proceed to condemn the property of the Waverly Water Company. This matter came up some months ago. The village maintained that the law requiring such consent had reference only to cases where new and additional sources of supply were to be taken, and not to the mere transfer of an old property already in use for that purpose.

Whether the village will appeal is uncertain. It will probably resolve itself into a question of expediency whether it will obtain the consent of the commission or carry the matter up.
