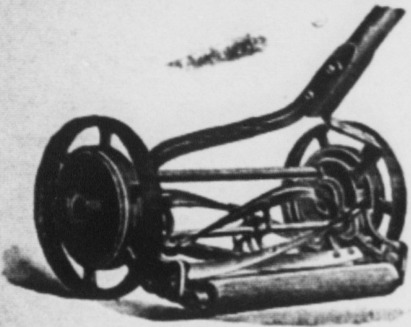

LOCAL BREVITIES

Coal shipments are constantly increasing on the Lehigh Valley and other eastern roads.

Lehigh Valley officials are considerably bothered in order to get men to work on the tracks.

Attorney C. C. Yocum has been chosen by the local Grand Army post to deliver the Memorial Day address.

The band stand repairs are nearly completed and the structure presents a decidedly improved appearance.

LEHIGH IN NEED OF MANY MEN

Large Number of Jobs are Open for Men Acquainted with the Freight Service

That business is good on the Lehigh Valley is attested by the posting of a large number of notices for men wanted in various parts of the service. At the local station notices have been posted on the bulletin boards as follows: A flagman and brakeman are wanted for an extra run between Towanda and Bernice, 5 conductors, 5 flagmen and 5 brakemen are wanted for BJ-4, JS-1, BJ-6 and BJ-3, between Sayre and Mahoning. 1 trainman is wanted for Nos. 116 and 36 east and Nos. 21 and 125 west, between Wilkes-Barre and Manchester, a baggagemaster is wanted on 116 and 38 east and Nos. 21 and 125 west, a baggagemaster is also wanted on Nos. 3 and 8 between Suspension Bridge and Jersey City, and a baggagemaster on trains No. 157 and 146, between Sayre and Buffalo.

The passenger and freight traffic on the Lehigh at the present time is heavy and the road is the greater part of the time taxed to the limit. The train crews and shop men are making better time than last month and the effects of the settlement of the coal strike are being felt in more ways than one.

STOCK COMPANY ORGANIZING

The actors and actresses who have been engaged for the summer stock company which is to open the season at Oak Grove Park, are arriving in town, and several of them have taken up quarters at the Wilbur house. It is expected that the entire company will be assembled today and that rehearsals will begin tomorrow. The people that have been engaged are the best in the business and first-class plays will be presented.

AN ITALIAN VILLAGE

A good sized Italian village has been located on the flats near the Lanning farm in Wysox township. Over forty carloads of the foreigners, employed on the stone ballast of the Lehigh, were yesterday shipped to that point. Five wells have been driven to supply them with water and shanties will be erected for them to occupy. There are nearly 400 men in the gang.

The court has granted the petition of the rector, wardens and vestrymen of the Church of the Redeemer of this place, for an amendment to the charter of the church corporation, incorporating section 7 of the Act of April 25, 1855, providing that all property coming to the church shall inure to and be in control of the lay members and officers of the society.

SCHOOL BOARD MET LAST NIGHT

J. W. Bishop and D. Clarye Coal Company Secure Contracts for the Winter's Supply of Fuel

The Sayre borough school directors held a meeting last night for the purpose of awarding the contracts for the winter's supply of coal. Nearly all the members of the board were present and bids from coal dealers were opened and read.

The bids were as follows: D. Clarye & Co., egg, per ton, \$5 30; pea, \$3 90. J. W. Bishop, egg, \$5 25; pea, \$3 95. Coleman Hassler, egg, \$5 47; pea, \$4 30.

J. W. Bishop was awarded the contract for furnishing 150 tons of the egg size and the Clarye company secured the pea coal contract, and will furnish 50 tons. An Athens coal dealer submitted prices for coal at the mines, but the board did not consider this proposition. The prices at which the school district will secure coal this year are the lowest in years.

GREAT FIRE SHOW

It is problematical as to the exact amount of money lost yearly by fire, but that it amounts to many millions of dollars yearly is an undisputed fact. As to the loss of life in fires it is appalling. Of all the grim reapers of the harvest of death the lurid fongue of fire cuts down the larger share. Fifty veteran fire fighters will show with the most complete and up to date fire fighting apparatus, including three of the latest model fire engines and water towers, what it entails to subdue a fire in ten and twelve story buildings, not with a frame and canvas structure, but on buildings of seven and twelve stories in height, built especially of steel to fit in the perspective panorama of the city of Baltimore as it appeared the afternoon of that eventful fire.

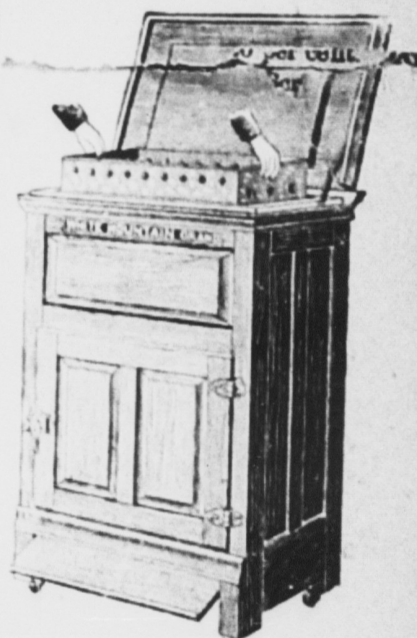
