CIRCUS EMPLOYEES CLASH AT BATAVIA

Fire Department and Police Called Out to Quell Riot Which Might Have Resulted Seriously

A serious clash between the cowboys of Colonel Cummins' show and Walter L. Main's employes occurred at Batavia early yesterday morning and for a time furnished considerable excitement for the police and fire departments of that city and a large crowd of men and boys who had gathered at the railroad tracks to see the exhibition got out of town.

Some time ago Cummins and Main combined their shows and shortly thereafter trouble began to brew. Tuesday afternoon matters began to assume a serious aspect. Charles Higley, chief of the cowboys, and the horsemen of the Main show had a severe fight. The horseman was badly beaten. It was necessary to call a physician to attend to the man's injuries, and from that time until the departure of the show the employes were in an uproar. At 8 o'clock in the evening Higley and Main met and a serious altercation over the fight between Higley and the horseman ensued. Main became furious with rage and threw his hat and coat in the dust at the cowboy's feet. He then drew a revolver and leveled the weapon at Higley. The latter never flinched. Colonel Cummins jumped between the men and for a time succeeded in quieting the disturbance. Trouble was expected at the railway station, however, and Officer Griffiths was stationed there. The Main employes, about fifty in number, were lying in wait for Higley, and finally learned that he was in an alley in Liberty street. In the alley were stationed Officer Griffiths, Higley, Col. Cummins and two other cowboys. The employes formed a semi circle around them. Just as matters again began to look serious the firemen arrived and turned a stream of water on the crowd, which dispersed. Higley was arrested for safe keeping and paid a fine of \$25 for carrying concealed weapons. After his release he stated that had he called out the cowboys and Indians a big fight would have ensued and many innocent persons been shot, which he did not want to occur.

The show exhibits at Waverly on Saturday, afternoon and evening, but it is hoped that the difficulties existing between the two factions will have been settled and that no blood will be shed.

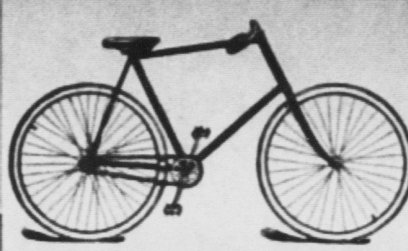

ORDINANCE NO. 22

Granting consent to the Valley Telephone Company (a corporation of the State of New York duly authorized to do business in Pennsylvania), to use and occupy the streets, lanes, alleys, bridges, and public grounds of the Borough of South Waverly for the purpose of erecting poles, stringing wires and constructing subways with man-holes in connection with the building, operating and maintaining a Telephone system in the Borough of South Waverly.

Section 1. BE IT ENACTED by the Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same, that consent is hereby given and granted to the Valley Telephone Company (a corporation of the State of New York authorized to do business in the State of Pennsylvania), its successors or assigns, to use and occupy the streets, lanes, alleys, bridges, and public grounds of the Borough of South Waverly, and over or under the same as hereinafter specified, for the purpose of erecting poles, stringing wires and constructing subways with man-holes, in connection with the building and maintaining of a Telephone system and proper usual appliances in connection therewith.

Section 2. That the said Company, its successors or assigns, shall construct its lines with the usual and necessary appliances, and maintain and operate the same in and on the streets, lanes, bridges and public grounds of the said Borough as hereinafter specified, at its expense and in conformity with the ordinances, resolutions and regulations of the said Borough now in force, or such reasonable regulations hereinafter made.

Section 3. All work done pursuant to the franchise hereby granted, shall be under the direct supervision and subject to the approval of the Borough Council as follows:

All poles to be erected by the said Company, its successors or assigns, shall be under the direction of the Council in said Borough or its proper authorized Committee and agents, and to be of such kind and character and located at such points as shall be approved by the said Borough through its Council, its Committee, authorized agents, and all incidental repairs and necessary changes shall be under the same supervision subject to the same approval of the said Borough and its authorized representatives.

Section 4. The franchise hereby granted shall not be considered as depriving the Borough of South Waverly from granting other Telephone franchises.

Section 5. It is also made a condition for the granting of this franchise that the said Company, its successors and assigns shall furnish the Borough of South Waverly and to its subscribers a good and sufficient telephone service, and that the said Company, its successors and assigns shall not ask, charge, demand or collect from any of its subscribers in the said Borough of South Waverly, for the telephone service furnished, more than the following rates, to wit:

Not to exceed Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) per annum for business telephone service on single metallic circuit, or Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) per annum for residence service on single metallic circuit.

Section 6. This franchise, and all rights thereunder, shall terminate at the expiration of forty-five (45) years from the date of its granting.
