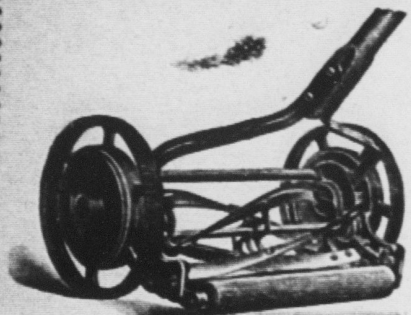

## SOLDIER BOYS IN SAYRE LAST NIGHT

Second Battalion, Twelfth Infantry Regulars, Stopped Here for Short Time—Enroute for New York

Last night between 7 and 8 o'clock Sayre was honored by the presence of a battalion of Uncle Sam's real live soldier boys who have just completed 25 months' service in the Philippine Islands and were on their way to New York city, having received orders to report for duty at the Metropolis this morning at 6 o'clock.

The soldiers belonged to the Second Battalion, Twelfth Infantry, U. S. Regulars, and numbered nearly 1,500 men. A special Lehigh Valley train consisting of 15 cars arrived here at precisely 7 o'clock, and in less than five minutes after its arrival the streets of Sayre fairly swarmed with soldiers. The officers of the battalion accompanied by their wives went to the Wilbur house where supper had been prepared for them, while the men who composed the rank and file walked about the business section of the town and otherwise amused themselves. The train stopped here for nearly 40 minutes and in the meantime a big crowd collected at the station. The girls were out in full force and the soldier boys could not help but see the many admiring glances that were bestowed upon them. The battalion was accompanied by a band and just previous to the train starting two selections were rendered in an artistic manner, while the members of the battalion who had chosen to remain on the cars entertained the crowd by passing large pieces of hardtack out through the windows.

The battalion was composed of a fine looking lot of young men, none of them apparently over 25 years, and during their brief visit in Sayre they conducted themselves in a most orderly manner.

As heretofore stated the battalion has been in the Philippine service but recently orders have been received transferring them to New York. They were to report for duty at that place this morning at 6 o'clock, and as there has been plenty of time given them for the trip, the stop in Sayre was considerably longer than it would have been under ordinary conditions.

## YOUNG GIRL IS BITTEN BY DOG

Animal's Teeth Sank into Her Neck, Causing an Extensive Wound

The four-year old daughter of Sidney Cole, a resident of Keystone avenue, was bitten by a dog this morning. The animal's teeth sank into the girl's neck, barely missing the carotid artery, leaving a wound of considerable depth. The right ear was also lacerated, and while the bite is considered to be of an extensive nature, it is not thought serious results will follow. The little girl had been sent on an errand, when the dog, which was a large one, sprang at her throat. Dr. C. A. Haines was called and cauterized the injuries.

## MISTAKEN IMPRESSION

It is unlawful to kill domesticated animals caught destroying crops or other property. It is a mistaken impression, however, and the person who does the shooting is liable to prosecution. The owner of the pigeons or chickens, however, is liable for the damage done.

## BLOOD COVERED PILOT

An engine came into the round house from the east this morning and shortly after its arrival a quantity of blood was found spattered on the pilot. Later a man's cap was found, which with the discovery of the blood, has given rise to the belief that the engine struck and killed some unknown person during the night. The local officials are unable to learn of anyone having been killed.

## SAWMILL BURNED

The sawmill operated by Ephriam Swackhammer at Homet's Ferry burned to the ground between 8 and 9 o'clock last night. The origin of the fire is not known. The loss is total, as it is said there was no insurance.

## MANGLED BODY FOUND ON TRACKS

Unknown Man Killed Just West of Geneva Last Night

This morning between one and two o'clock the crew on the west bound Lehigh Valley train No. 19 found the terribly mangled remains of a man lying on the east bound track near Ochs Corners, a small station just west of Geneva. The body was so badly mutilated that it was impossible to identify it. The clothing was nearly torn from the body but from the appearances it is thought that the victim may have been one of the soldiers of the Second Battalion, 5th Infantry which passed over the Lehigh yesterday afternoon. The clothing bears a resemblance to a soldier's uniform. It is thought that the man fell from a moving train. The Lehigh detectives are making an investigation.

## A SOCIETY HORSE SHOW

Some months ago, when President Roosevelt declared in a speech at Denver that the United States government would develop by careful breeding a standard and pure American type of carriage or general utility horse, he pleased the native horse fanciers mightily. When the president made this statement he knew that the government would be handicapped from the outset by cliques of foreign dealers who have been flooding the country—wherever a horse market happened to be—with foreign types that are utterly unsuited to the demand in this country and not adaptable for use on the asphalt pavements of American cities. Moreover, it is conceded by experts that the foreign types have neither the quality or the endurance of the native horses bred from Morgan or Hambletonian strains. Every effort made to demonstrate, in an international class of horses, the superiority of the American cross, has been frustrated by antagonistic breeders in the shows of the west and east, and few horse lovers have had the opportunity to discriminate between the various types. A good opportunity will be given the public to see the most complete horse show ever organized when the Cummins Greater Wild West arrives on Saturday, May 26, at Waverly, over 300 of the best types of truly handsome horses having been secured from all parts of the world to make the representation complete.

## BURGESS ISSUES ORDERS

Burgess Cross has issued orders to the police department to rigidly enforce the curfew law. The nights at this season of the year are particularly attractive to the young who would rather remain out of doors than on the inside. The ordinance, however, requires that all children under the age of 16, unless accompanied by parents or guardians, shall be off the streets after 9 o'clock. The street corner loafer has also come under the ban of the burgess and hereafter the practice of standing about the streets must be discontinued or arrests will follow.
