Quarreleome Ocean Cannibal The life story of a single lobster famfly of 30,600 brothers and sisters is entertainingly told by Henry Morrow in Technical World Magazine. Yet the experts of the government fish commission estimate that if only two out of 10,000 baby lobsters survive the species will be maintained at its normal number.
