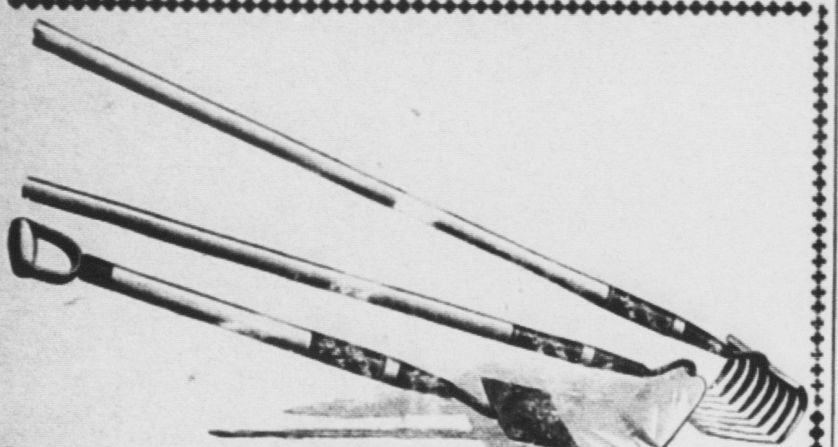

SOLDIER DEAD ARE FITTINGLY HONORED

Yesterday's Memorial Services Were of An Impressive and Interesting Character

The soldier dead were fittingly honored in Sayre yesterday by the members of Mallery Post, G. A. R., the P. O. S. of A. and the citizens of the borough generally. The program as previously arranged was carried out to the letter. The various cemeteries where lie the bones of dead heroes were visited, flowers were strewn upon their graves, and an appropriate service in Hospital park ended the day's program.

The line of march assembled on time and moved toward the cemeteries, headed by the Packer band. Following the band were the police, the burgess and the members of the town council in carriages. After visiting the cemeteries the parade countermarched to Hospital park, where a large crowd of citizens had collected. The services here were of an exceedingly impressive and interesting character. Attorney C. C. Yecum delivered an admirable address, which was listened to with undivided attention on the part of the audience.

WENT TO ITHACA

Frank Wood, representative of The Record, and Andrew L. Cotton, Sayre correspondent of the Athens News, went to Ithaca to attend the races and field day sports in that city. Both tell glowing stories of the day's events, and Mr. Cotton, who has recently developed a decided penchant for amateur photography, returned with some fine pictures of the race course, just as the four crews were lined up for the start, and also of Percy Field while the ball game was in progress.

Mahlon Stark, a boilermaker, was taken suddenly ill while working at the roundhouse this morning. Stark was engaged in repairing the inside of a boiler and carried a lighted torch. The heat from the boiler affected him and he came out drunk freely of ice water, and shortly afterward fell over unconscious. A fellow workman saw him and went to his assistance. Efforts to revive him were unsuccessful and he was placed on a stretcher and carried to his father's home at 112 Miller street. Dr. A. H. LaPlant was called and worked over the young man for nearly an hour before he succeeded in restoring him to consciousness. He will probably be compelled to lay off from work for several days.

SAYRE PLAYERS WERE ROTTEN

So Says a Corning Correspondent in This Morning's Advertiser

Here is the way the Corning correspondent sizes up the base ball game which was played in that city yesterday afternoon: "The Spauldings easily defeated the Sayre team at East Side Park by a score of 14 to 3. The game was disgusting from a spectator's point of view, and after the first few innings the majority of the large crowd left the field. The Sayre team was positively the worst aggregation of barn stormers that Corning has seen in some time. Mahanney pitched a fairly good game and with any kind of support would have made a creditable showing, but the men behind him played like a gang of hay leaguers. The infield was especially rotten and the only reason the outfield made a better showing was because they had less chances. This was the first regular base ball game of the season, and Corning's first taste of so-called amateur base ball."

LOOKS LIKE STEVENS FOR REPRESENTATIVE

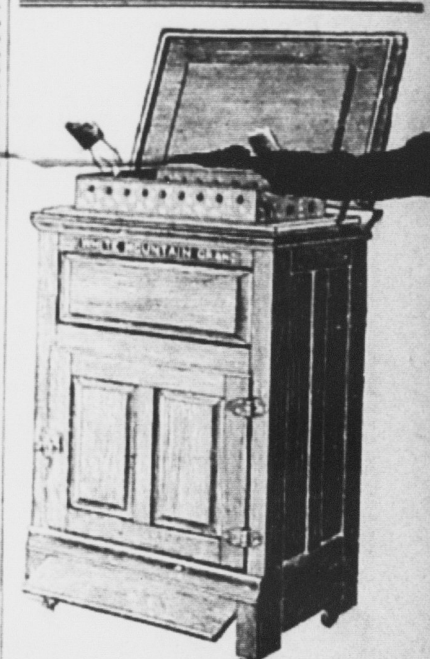
