#### MICHAEL DAVITT DEAD.

Irish Patriot's Notable Career Closed at Midnight Last Night.

DUBLIN, May 31.—Michael Davitt died at midnight last night, and a notable career in Irish history is closed.

After a long illness Michael Davitt died peacefully and painlessly in the presence of his oldest son, Michael, his two daughters and John Dillon, who had devotedly attended him through his illness, and of many of his most intimate friends.

Shortly before his death Father Hatton had been with him. Mrs. Davitt, who had been in constant attendance on her husband until a few days ago, when she herself was taken ill, lies prostrate in the same hospital, too weak to leave her room. She has not yet been informed of her husband's death.

It is stated that Mr. Davitt left a written message to the Irish people.

The greatest sympathy has been displayed by all classes of society during Mr. Davitt's illness. The hospital was besieged by anxious inquirers. John E. Redmond, leader of the Irish party in parliament, was a frequent inquirer by telephone from the house of commons and gave up his proposed continental trip over the Whit Sunday holidays in consequence of the condition of his friend, the father of the Irish Land League. After a rally Tuesday night Mr. Davitt was able to speak to those at his bedside, but soon showed that he was losing ground.

Among the last callers at the hospital last night was Lord Hampden on behalf of the Earl of Aberdeen and the Countess of Aberdeen.

Mr. Davitt retired from the representation of South Mayo in parliament in 1890, but to the last took a keen interest in the politics of his country.

Memorial Day in Paris.

PARIS, May 31.—A representative gathering of Americans, including the staffs of the embassy and consulate, was present at the annual ceremony on Memorial day of decorating with flowers the tomb of Lafayette in Picpus cemetery. Henry Vignaud, secretary of the American embassy, presided. Splendid wreaths were received from the Lafayette post, G. A. R., the Colonial Dames and the American Club of Paris. Mrs. J. M. Horton of Buffalo addressed the assemblage in behalf of the Daughters of the American Revolution.
