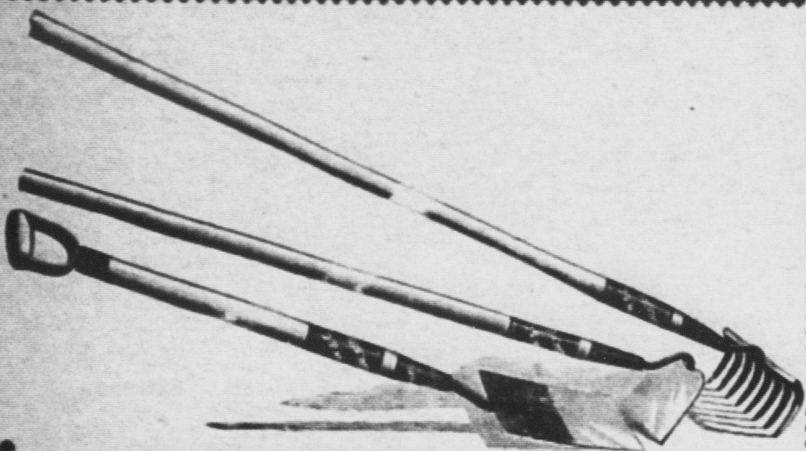

HARRY GETTS GETS FIVE LONG YEARS

He Pleaded Guilty to Robbery From the Person--Other Court News

Harry Getts, charged with robbery from the person of John H. Abbott of East Towanda, pleaded guilty to the charge before Judge Fanning at Towanda yesterday and was sentenced to five years in the Eastern penitentiary and pay a fine of \$50 and also the costs of prosecution. Getts has a long police record and had frequently been made an inmate of the Bradford county jail on various charges, and this fact no doubt had weight with the court when sentence was pronounced.

Emma Walker, colored, another thief who pleaded guilty to stealing \$40 from the home of W. B. Guntion of Towanda, where she was employed as a domestic, was fined \$50, the costs of prosecution and imprisonment in the penitentiary for 18 months.

A session of juvenile court was also held by Judge Fanning yesterday, and three children were sent to the house of refuge. They were Lucy Heeman, 11 years old, of Towanda township, who has no parents or known relatives; Cora Parker, Towanda, 16 years old, who was found on the streets drunk, and James Wesley Chilson, son of Wesley Chilson, a blind man.

STOLEN PROPERTY LOCATED AT LAST

After Three Years John F. Dolan Finds Trace of Missing Tackle Blocks

Three years ago when Contractor John F. Dolan was building a new pier in the bridge across the Lehigh at Milltown a tackle block including a quantity of rope was stolen, and despite vigorous efforts on the part of Mr. Dolan and the police department the missing property never was located. The other day, however, Mr. Dolan, who is now located at Towanda, where he has the contract for doing the construction work for the Lehigh, received an anonymous communication. The letter was postmarked at Sayre and stated that the missing tackle block and rope could be found at a certain house located on the east side. Mr. Dolan sent the letter to Chief Walsh and the latter went to the occupant of the house designated in the letter and told him that there would be something doing unless the tackle blocks and rope were returned to him by 7 o'clock this evening.

THEY WANT BLOOD STAINED GARMENTS

Attorneys for Charles Johnson Have Filed Their Reasons for Asking for New Trial

Messrs. Wilson and McPherson, attorneys for Charles Johnson, convicted of murder in the first degree, yesterday filed their reasons for setting aside the verdict and asking for a new trial. The principal allegations are that the evidence presented by the Commonwealth at the trial was insufficient. The prisoner's attorneys also presented a petition to the court asking to be allowed to have a piece of the garments alleged to bear blood stains, and which the prisoner admitted he wore on the day of the murder. The cloth will be subjected to chemical tests to determine whether or not there is blood upon them.

When such a man is willing to stand for an office the people ought to rally to his support, and the people of Bradford county will make a mistake if they fail to make Dr. Stevens one of their representatives in the next Legislature. He is best known in the eastern part of the county and will doubtless poll the leading vote through that section and in the vicinity of his residence. Athens, Sayre and South Waverly ought to give him a strong support. He may have a stronger competition in the western part of the county, so that his friends and supporters will need to rally and be on the alert if they would see him successful.

No truer and more trustworthy man can be found for a public office than Dr. C. L. Stevens, and he will both grace and honor a seat in the capitol in Harrisburg if the people of Bradford county send him there. An Ulster Republican

He also says that the husband of the murdered woman has never been brought to the jail to identify him.

CITIZENS' COLUMN. A VOICE FROM ULSTER

Editor Valley Record:

June 16, the time set for the Republican primaries in Bradford county is not far in the future, and every Republican in the county should be on hand with his mind made up as to the candidates he would name for the county offices. 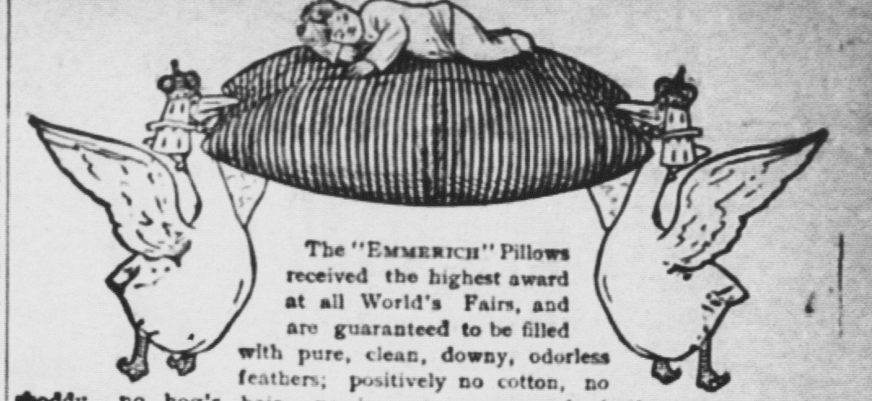
