NEW SENATOR FOR KANSAS.

Foster D. Coburn Named to Represent Sunflower State. TOPEKA, Kan., June 6.—Foster Dwight Coburn of Kansas City, Kan., agriculturist, was appointed United States senator by Governor E. W. Hoch to succeed J. Ralph Burton, who has resigned.

Mr. Coburn was born in Jefferson county, Wis. in 1846. He served in two Illinois regiments during the civil



war and settled in Kansas in 1867. He has served for the last sixteen years as secretary of the Kansas state board of agriculture. He was a commissioner of live stock exhibits at the St. Louis exposition in 1904.

MIGHT UPSET THE WORLD.

Georgians Fear That Pacific Ocean Would Run Into Atlantic. WASHINGTON, June 6.—At the session of the Panama canal committee Mr. Stevens, chief engineer, explained in detail what is known as the eighty-five foot level type of canal. This contemplates building a dam at Gatun on the Atlantic side and at Laboon on the Pacific side, backing up the waters of the two water sheds and thus avoiding digging or dredging for a total of twenty-eight miles of the distance. This type of canal could be built in eight years, he said.

When Mr. Stevens explained that the difference in tide between the Pacific and Atlantic sides of the isthmus was about twenty feet Representative Adams (Ga.) remarked that he had been asked by a number of "hard-shells" whether there was not danger when the canal was built of one ocean running into the other and turning the world over. "I told them," he continued, "that the world was turning over now as fast as she could and this would not make much difference."

Bar American Canned Meats. LONDON, June 6.—The Daily Telegraph this morning asserts that all admiralty and war office contracts which have been placed since the disclosures affecting the meat packing industry in

the United States stipulate that canned meats must be British or colonial products.

In a Fight Over a Shovel. NEWARK, N. Y., June 6.—During a fight over the possession of a shovel by a gang of Italians working on the New York Central railroad near Palmyra, N. Y., a number of the men were seriously hurt, five of them sustaining fractures of the skull.
