FIRE ALARM

Waverly—The Waverly Fire Alarm System will be ready for operation by the end of next week. For the benefit of our readers, we print below a list of the numbers and location of the boxes, together with directions for their use. Messrs. Shepard & Stamford, of 350 Broad street, Waverly, will be glad to explain the operation of the system to any citizens desiring further information. They also have cards with the following directions and numbers, which will be given to any one calling for them.

Directions—In case of fire keep cool, go to the nearest fire alarm box, break the glass in the key guard, unlock and open the door. Pull down the handle and let go. Remain at the box until the fire department responds, and then direct the firemen to the fire.

Don't pull the box if the bells are already ringing.

Don't pull a street box as an experiment. You will be liable to a fine not to exceed \$100.00.

Oolong Tea.

It is estimated that in 15 years the export of Chinese-grown oolong tea from the port of Amoy has fallen off from approximately 16,000,000 pounds to 900,000 pounds. Of this the United States imported not one pound. There were shipped, however, through the port of Amoy to America, in 1904, 11,324,967 pounds of oolong tea from Formosa.

New York Bonds

In less than two years New York has issued \$132,500,000 of bonds offset to a small extent, however, by the payment of maturing issues and by an accumulating sinking fund. Deducting the sinking fund, the debt on January 1, was \$472,575,000, against \$376,000,000 two years before and \$279,900,000 on January 1, 1901.

Hurts Flour Trade.

The Chinese boycott is being felt by the flour men of California. Two years ago the Stockton mills were shipping 10,000 barrels a year to China. Now they are shipping only 4,000.

French Losing Politeness.

Paris dancing masters are lamenting the decline of French elegance in the art. They assert that the French are losing their old habits of politeness and as a dancing nation are declining.

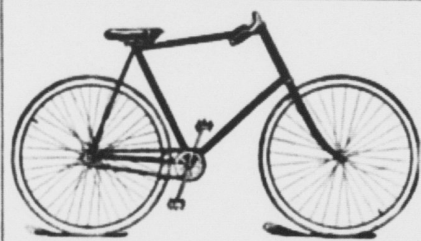
